I am pleased to present the President's Report for the month of February 2024, highlighting key events and engagements undertaken during this period.

On 1 February, we held the General Electors Meeting, which saw a commendable turnout of community members. The session was marked by fruitful exchange of ideas and a substantial number of questions, reflecting the active engagement of our community members.

Following this, on 2 February, I participated in the Goldfields Voluntary Regional Organisation of Councils (GVROC) meeting held in Kalgoorlie. Addressing pertinent issues concerning our region. Discussed items included endorsing the Safer Goldfields Regional Action Plan (SGRAP), reviewing the Goldfields Esperance Regional Road update, Native Title impacts for regional development, reliable and sustainable power supply for the region, cost of living impacts for regional and remote communities, and mitigation plans/programs for local governments in the event of mining or other industry sector closures.

On 6 February, I engaged in a productive meeting with Brightstar Resources, exploring avenues for collaboration and discussing matters of mutual interest and benefit to our community.

Later in the month, on 15 February, I joined the Town Hall Meeting focused on the Menzies Hotel, witnessing a strong turnout from the community. Community members raised their concerns about the future of Menzies Hotel, and constructive dialogues happened. Responses from Dave Hadden, Sudhir, Dave, and Sue were duly noted.

Continuing our community engagements, on 20 February, I participated in discussions with Cyclclassic organisers regarding this year's Cyclclassic Event.

Moreover, on the same day, I conducted an online session with Rick Wilson, Member for O'Connor and Neil Thompson, Shadow Minister for Planning, Environment, Lands and Heritage and Member for the Mining and Pastoral Region, addressing concerns raised by local governments affected by the downturn in the nickel industry.

Lastly, on 23 February, I attended the GVROC State Council meeting via Zoom, leveraging technology to actively participate in regional governance initiatives despite logistical challenges.

Heavy rain in the Kookynie area late in January resulted in severe damage to Malcolm Road and Mt Remarkable Road and damage to Kookynie Yarri Road. Our own staff and a contractor spent more than two weeks repairing the damage. This took away from usual maintenance grading, but this has since been re-commenced.

Damage from strong winds late last year resulted in damage to the water park/children's playground area. The sail over the playground is being replaced, but we have decided to erect a solid roof over the water park. This is currently being ordered and will be erected as soon as possible.

In mid-February the water park suffered an electrical fault which resulted in the park being out of action for a few days. This has since been rectified. It has been disappointing to see the amount of rubbish left at the water park, especially when several bins are located very close to the park.

The surface of the airstrip at Kookynie has been levelled and rolled, removing the cattle tracks crossing it. An aerial survey team will shortly be utilizing the strip. The Menzies airstrip continues to suffer damage from vehicles using it as a drag strip. This results in our crew having to level and roll surface

Recent rain has resulted in grass and weed growth and this is being controlled by the works crew,

Garbage collection has been affected by a worn hydraulic pump on the waste collection truck which only functions when oil is fairly cool. The crew have been doing their best to collect during early morning, but this has forced us to spread the work over several days. A new pump has been purchased and we are awaiting delivery.

The crew have been attempting to keep as many trees as possible alive by hand watering , where irrigation is not available, through the hot months and have succeeded with most. If any resident is interested in planting footpath trees, and being responsible for their maintenance, they should contact me to discuss the suitability of location and species.

Wilson Street, Onslow Street and Sandstone Road are currently being used heavily by mining trucks and drivers should take extra care on these roads.

This month features a new and enthusiastic pair that have in just 5 short months created something from nothing.

You will guess, when you see the photo of the sunflowers, that I am of course talking about Sam and Lucy. I remember that just weeks after arriving back to his family home, Sam was dashing about the garden like Johnny Appleseed, sowing Sunflower seeds into any old pot or old garden bed he could find. The result is a real show of different sized and coloured sunflowers produced over the Summer season.

What I did not realise was how devoted Sam and Lucy both are to plants. This is most obvious when you see the huge variety of potted plants that have been transported here from Lucy's old home in Perth. There are so many types that the photo I took does not do them justice but if you are keen why not ask them for a tour.

Sam has been working hard at getting the ground broken up enough to plant in. Their block seems to sit on hard quartz in places. Sam's solution is to dig a hole and fill it with new soil. The quartz rock inside the hole holds the water like a reservoir for these harsh conditions. Look at the growth of the passion fruit with just 4 weeks in the ground!

The other stand out in their garden is the converted shade house over what was an old chook run. The tomatoes and basil, rosemary, leafy greens, mint, parsley, cucumbers to name a few all powering on under the watchful eye of these avid green thumbs.

But it is perhaps through this act of “trying to grow flowers in the desert” that the resilience of those that chose to live in this outback outpost is best reflected and for the romantic also the optimism that went into the founding of our little town and that perhaps that optimism is still part of our DNA.

Flowery words aside pun intended, Lucy and I have recently made our home in Menzies and we both wanted to make a garden to spend our time, enjoy in leisure and perhaps to supplement the pantry.

One of the conditions of Lucy moving to Menzies was that her plants come with her, although warned by many that this would result in their demise. She quickly found a home for them under the shade of the back veranda and with water they have flourished, the choice of succulent being ideal for the situation.

I also had my conditions and they were that I would be able to grow sunflowers aplenty and with water they too seemed to have flourished during the cursed months.

Making use of the infrastructure available to us we quickly put to use the shade house, while our initial crop of tomatoes was bountiful, they have since withered and the hard summer months belong to the basil, chillies and the apple cucumber which my father recommended based on his recollections of his childhood in Gwalia.

As we head into Autumn, we hope to plant more tomatoes and we hope the vines we planted reward us with fruit after keeping them alive through the trying months.

After the months of tribulation perhaps the exhalation now is of relief as we look forward to more favourable conditions in the garden and more pleasant days to be spent in them.

Using 1080 poison are carried out across Western Australian, including this area, and are aimed at controlling wild dogs, feral cats, feral pigs, foxes and rabbits. The poison baits remain toxic for many months. You need to exercise caution. Domestic pets should be kept close and under control at all times. Owners may consider the use of leads and muzzles for their domestic pets.

1080 baiting is part of an integrated pest management program protecting livestock from death and injury reducing the impact on pastoral and agricultural production, and helping to preserve the unique flora and fauna of WA. Baits are not intentionally laid in public areas such as road reserves, parking bays, rest stops or roadhouses however can be inadvertently moved into these areas by animals and birds.


