FIRE SAFETY FOR WINTER CAMPING TRIPS

Looking after your campfire:

- Keep your fire just big enough for cooking and keeping warm
- Never leave your fire unattended, not even for a minute.
 Put your fire out properly with water not soil, even if going for a short walk or swim
- Extinguish your fire at night. Many children are burnt by campfires in the morning from hot ashes and embers
- Children and pets should be supervised at all times when near a fire
- Use only fallen dead wood. Branches or leaves from living trees damages the environment and can cause high levels of smoke
- Keep a bucket of water nearby



Grills promotes community crime prevention advocacy

Mining and Pastoral Region MP Dave Grills MLC is reminding regional communities throughout WA of the important role organisations such as Neighbourhood Watch play in helping keep communities safe and prevent crime.

Mr Grills met Neighbourhood Watch (NHW) Australasia chief executive Ingrid Stonhill and vicepresident Bernie Durkin on Wednesday in Perth.

Based in Queensland, Ms Stonhill travelled to WA to visit Laverton earlier this week before meeting Mr Grills and Mr Durkin to discuss how youth crime can be better addressed in North West communities.

She also attended the NHW WA State board meeting and met with Police Minister Liza Harvey.

Mr Grills said recent reports of juvenile crime in towns including Broome and Kununurra showed the issue continued to be a problem and was a concern for community members.

"There have been several reports lately of serious crimes involving juveniles despite efforts being made by northern communities to curb this sort of behaviour," he said.

"I have a strong belief in community engagement and feel that operational amendments made to the NHW program will, as is their pledge, continue to enable safer and vibrant communities."

Mr Grills participated in a Youth Crime Forum in Broome in March and said he would continue to support safer communities through promoting organisations such as NHW.

"I would be pleased to work with individuals or groups who share my enthusiasm to address youth crime," he said.

WA Police is the custodian of the state's Neighbourhood Watch program, which has been successfully operating since 1982, starting in Bunbury and quickly spreading across all Australian jurisdictions.

Mr Grills, a former police officer, said there was a resurgence of Neighbourhood Watch occurring and was especially keen to promote the "ewatch" aspect of the program.

"NHW in WA has more than 260 active volunteers and 10,840 community members participating in ewatch, an online tool allowing residents to connect with local police, councils and neighbours to make their neighbourhoods safer," he said.

BreastScreen WA provides a high quality, FREE screening mammography service for women in WA over 40 with no breast symptoms.

Since it commenced service in 1989, BreastScreen WA has been recognised as a centre of excellence in screening mammography. The service aims to

reduce death and suffering associated with breast cancer through early detection. BreastScreen WA has six metropolitan screening services and four mobile units which visit most country towns and the outer metropolitan area every two years. It is a centrally coordinated service which ensures all West Australian women receive the same high quality service, regardless of where they live. BreastScreen WA maintains a central registry of women aged over 50 years and ensures that each of these women receives a reminder notice to attend for mammography screening every two years.

Accreditation

BreastScreen WA has full accreditation status with the national breast screening program. This means the service meets BreastScreen Australia's rigorous National Accreditation Requirements. Accreditation ensures a state-of-the-art multidisciplinary approach to screening, assessment and management of screen-detected breast abnormalities. It includes all aspects of the process including technical quality assurance, community and professional education, counselling, consumer satisfaction, data management and staff training.



Joint Media Statement

Changes to Black Spot Programme for safer regional roads

20 June 2014: The eligibility criteria for the Black Spot Programme has been changed to make it easier for regional communities to compete for additional funding for road safety projects. y.

Assistant Minister for Infrastructure and Regional Development Jamie Briggs announced today that in 2015–16 and 2016–17 the Australian Government's investment in the Black Spot Programme will almost triple to \$160 million a year.

Changes to the eligibility criteria are:

- At least 50 per cent of the funding for 15/16 and 16/17 is dedicated to regional roads;
- Reducing the minimum required benefit cost ratio for funded projects from 2:1 to 1:1; and
- · Reducing the crash history requirement from three to two casualty crashes in five years.

Member for O'Connor Rick Wilson MP welcomed the announcement saying the changes will deliver significant benefits for O'Connor by ensuring more economically productive infrastructure is built in regional areas whilst also delivering genuine road safety solutions.

"Broadening the criteria will significantly help small councils to successfully nominate projects that were previously ineligible under the existing guidelines.

"These changes will also help address the increased risks motorists face on regional roads with the per capita risk of death or hospitalisation following a crash in a rural area significantly higher than urban areas," he said.

Consultative Panels, consisting of representatives drawn from community and road user groups, industry and state and local government have been established in each state and territory to consider all nominated Black Spot sites.

"The criteria has also been amended so that more black spots can be fixed before they take lives and cause serious injuries. Under the new criteria, Consultative Panels will able to allocate up to 40% of funding to sites on the basis of a road safety audit.

"I encourage everyone in O'Connor, particularly local councils, to complete the online nomination form and tell the WA Consultatitve Panel about our local black spots," Mr Wilson said.


The Australian Government's record \$500 million investment in the Black Spot Programme will help save lives, boost productivity and create new local jobs throughout Australia.

There have been a number of motor vehicle accidents in the Menzies area over the past few months—three on the Evanston Road in April and May and another accident more recently, near the rail crossing on Niagara Road.

Some of the reasons for accidents are alcohol, drugs, using mobile phones while driving, fatigue and one of the most common reasons—speed.

Speeding may not even mean travelling over the speed limit, but driving too fast for prevailing conditions, such as the weather, vehicle, road, light, traffic and of course, the driver.

Speed limits warn people to slow down before sharp curves or hazardous sections of the road. If everyone travelled at the correct speed, it would be easier for drivers to judge closing distances and understand what other drivers intend to do.





ROYALTIES FOR REGIONS TRAVEL ASSISTANCE FOR PENSIONERS ON THE RISE 24 JUNE 2014

Regional pensioners will again benefit from one of the most popular Royalties for Regions initiatives, the Country Age Pension Fuel Card, which is set to increase in value from July 1^{\sharp} .

Since being introduced in May 2009 as one of the first Royalties for Regions initiatives, the Country Age Pension (CAP) Fuel Cards have had \$112.36million allocated to help pensioner travel needs.

Member for Kalgoorlie, Wendy Duncan said that around 1000 pensioners from the Goldfields region will be better supported in their travel and transport needs when the Country Age Pension Fuel Card value is increased from \$500 to \$550 on July 1.

"This follows on from a Nationals election commitment which will see a further \$125.938million of Royalties for Regions funds committed to the program's continuation through to 2017-18," said Ms Duncan.

"The Royalties for Regions Fuel Card has been of significant value to pensioners living in the regions through assisting them with their travel and transportation requirements. Its continuance and increase in value will only further assist with the transportation needs of regional pensioners whether it is utilised to attend medical appointments, for personal reasons or to keep connected and active within their communities."

The cards are available to anyone receiving a Centrelink Age Pension, Carer Payment, Disability Support Pension, Wife Pension or Widow B Pension or a Department of Veterans' Affairs Service Pension, Social Security Age Pension or Income Support Supplement.

"From the statistics provided it appears there are still eligible pensioners who have not yet applied for their fuel card and I strongly encourage them to do so as it will greatly assist with their transportation and mobility requirements which keep them active and connected to their communities."

Applicants must be living in non-metropolitan areas and cards are limited to one per couple.

Eligible persons can call 1300 666 609 to find the nearest participating country post office and complete a Country Age Pension Fuel Card application form.

NATIONALS SERVING LOCAL GOVERNMENT SECTOR'S BEST INTERESTS

26 JUNE 2014

A motion introduced to Parliament by The Nationals WA today could help regional local governments share resources and services while remaining free of forced amalgamation.

The motion introduced the Local Government Amendment (Regional Subsidiaries) Bill 2014, which proposes to amend the Local Government Act 1995 to allow two or more local governments establish a regional subsidiary.

Regional subsidiaries are body corporates formed by two or more local governments to jointly undertake the delivery of works and service activities.

Member for Kalgoorlie, Wendy Duncan MLA said the regional subsidiary model was an important tool that would allow local governments to maintain their unique identities while remaining economically sustainable.

"The Nationals have listened to the local government sector and their peak representative body WALGA and are implementing a regional subsidiaries model that will allow for greater flexibility in the creation of shared works and service entities," she said.

"This is a model that has been widely supported by regional local governments in the past and we believe is the most sensible way forward now."

The Nationals have long supported the introduction of a regional subsidiaries model in WA, dating back to 2010 when they introduced a similar bill to Parliament. The previous government introduced an updated version of the Bill in 2012 but it was terminated on the vacation of Parliament prior to the 2013 election.

"The Nationals remained resolutely opposed to any form of forced regional local government amalgamation, but a regional subsidiary model allowed for the streamlining of service delivery while maintaining communities' local identities."

"Our proposed amendments are modelled from South Australian legislation that has been in place since 1999 and proved very effective in the delivery of shared works and services through 21 existing regional subsidiaries in that state," she said.


"We want to provide local governments in WA with the tools to enhance their economic efficiency, offer greater capacity in the delivery of works and services and assist them in the pursuit of community and region-building objectives."

movie review

The Two Faces of January

Hossein Amini, who wrote such films as Drive and The Wings of a Dove, chose to adapt a lesser-known novel by Patricia Highsmith for his directorial debut—The Two Faces of January.

It begins on the steps of the Acropolis in Athens in 1962

where ex-pat American Rydel (Oscar Isaac) is leading a group of tourists. He's charming, knowledgeable and fluent in Greek. He's also a scam artist. Also touring the ancient monument are husband and wife Chester and Colette (Viggo Mortensen and Kirsten Dunst) who decide to hire Rydel as their guide. Chester is slightly sceptical about Rydel but Colette really takes to him.

The less said about the plot of this film the better, but there is a sense of unease right from the start which is justified before too long. Shot by Marcel Zyskind in glorious locations in Greece, Crete and Istanbul, there is visual pleasure to be had here. Viggo Mortensen brings both a charisma and a darkness to Chester and Oscar Isaac manages to imbue Rydel with a likeability against the odds. Kirsten Dunst has the less meaty role but she handles it well. The thing about Patricia Highsmith is her lack of interest in judging her characters, they are both black and white, which makes for an interesting tension in this very admirable directorial debut from the British-Iranian writer/director Hossein Amini. It's a classic movie, shot in conventional style, a rattling good story that's been very well told.

White Christmas Tree

- 1 topiary mould (see note) (about 20cm tall)
- 500g royal icing mix (see note)
- 4 x 100g boxes small meringues (see note) (you'll need about 170 meringues)
- 20 golden or silver cachous (see note)
- Cover mould first in plastic wrap, then foil. Sift the royal icing mix into a bowl and add 1/3 cup (80ml) warm water. Beat the mixture with electric beaters until a soft dropping consistency. Spread half the icing mixture over the mould (don't worry if it's not completely covered as the meringues will cover any patchy spots).
- Spread a little of the remaining royal icing on the bottom of each meringue and, starting at the base of the mould, start to build up in circles until tower is completely covered in meringues. Using tweezers, stick cachous here and there between meringues, pressing into the icing to stick.

Notes:

- Topiary moulds are from garden centres.
- Royal icing is a powdered pure icing suited to cake decorating, from specialty cake decorating and gourmet shops.
- Small meringues and cachous are available from supermarkets

This meringue tower makes a stunning decorative centrepiece.

The meringues can be easily removed and served with berries and whipped cream for dessert.

WESTERN AUSTRALIA WILDFLOWERS

Western Australia is home to more than 12,000 species of wildflowers with more than 60 per cent of these found nowhere else in the world. Every year they bring a spectacle of colour and scent that needs to be experienced to be believed scattered across 2.5 million square kilometres of terrain.

The wildflower season ranks as one of WA's most fascinating and precious natural treasures, attracting thousands of tourists and scientists to the State each year.

Rain and sunshine greatly influence the timing of the wildflower season, causing it to span over several months and regions.

Generally, wildflowers will begin to appear in June in the north of the State, extending through to November in the south.

A commonly found wildflower in this region is the Swainsona formosa, *Sturt's Desert Pea*, an Australian plant in the genus Swainsona, named after English botanist Isaac Swainson, famous for its distinctive blood-red leaf-like flowers, each with a bulbous black centre, or "boss". It is one of Australia's best known wildflowers. It is native to the arid regions of central and north-west Australia, and is found in all mainland states except Victoria.

ROYALTIES FOR REGIONS DELIVERING TO REGIONAL CLUBS AND ATHLETES

27 JUNE 2014

Goldfields sporting clubs and athletes are the winners in the second round of two State Government Supporting Community Sport schemes aimed at helping regional athletes pursue their sporting dreams and boost local club equipment stocks.

The \$2million Royalties for Regions funded Supporting Community Sport initiative, which was a Nationals WA election commitment in 2013, will see 16 Goldfields clubs and individuals supported through the most recent round.

Wendy Duncan MLA, Member for Kalgoorlie said that local athletes would receive grants under the Athlete Travel Subsidy Scheme, which supports talented regional athletes to pursue regional, State and national representation while local sporting clubs would receive a one-off \$500 subsidy to add to or upgrade sporting equipment shared by club members under the Community Sporting Club Equipment Subsidy Scheme.

Successful individuals to receive a travel subsidy represented a broad range of sporting interests' including basketball, AFL, swimming, cricket and golf.

"The Supporting Community Sport initiative offers sporting clubs financial support to ensure that regional sport continues to grow and thrive and that our regional sporting stars are provided better support to compete on a wider platform," said Ms Duncan.

"I am pleased to see yet another Nationals commitment being rolled out state-wide benefiting the lives and aspirations of regional people."

In this round, 129 regional athletes across Western Australia will share in a total of \$103,950 allocated for travel subsidies, and 229 regional sports clubs across the State will be given subsidies to purchase new equipment.

Supporting Community Sport programs are administered by the Department of Sport and Recreation and delivered through its nine regional offices. Applications for the next round of both schemes will open later this year.
