PRESIDENTS REPORT OCTOBER 2019

Friday 26 September

With some Electors and Councillors, I chaired the Electors Meeting. The Ordinary Meeting of Council was adjourned due to the lack of a quorum.

Sunday 29 September

With Cr J Dwyer we attended the opening of the Community Hub, featuring the new Aquatic Centre and Town Hall.

Friday 10 October

With Cr J Dwyer and the CEO, attended a Stakeholder Workshop for the Management of feral Cacti in Leonora. The Shire of Menzies is responsible for the eradication and ongoing control of invasive cacti in Townsites and Commons within its jurisdiction. The Shire needs to help and assist Pastoral Properties where infestations of Cacti can be identified, and programs or eradication can be set.

Tuesday 15 October

Along with Cr J Dwyer we attended the GNRBA AGM in Kalgoorlie.

Thursday 24 October

I met with Jeff Henderson from WALGA to participate in a short promotional video interview of the Shire of Menzies.

Friday 25 October

Along with Councillors, CEO and staff attended the Funeral Service of the Late Councillor Ian Tucker at the Maku Stadium in Kalgoorlie.

THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

CONGRATULATIONS

To newly elected Councillor Vashti Ashwin who was sworn in on the Menzies Council on October 31.

I am sure Councillor Ashwin will make a significant contribution to the community.

CARPET CLEANING

The Shire will be bringing a carpet cleaning service to Menzies in January. If anyone wants to have their carpets cleaned, without incurring a travel cost, please contact the Shire office and register your interest. We will advise the contractor of your details.



ASTRONOMICAL TELESCOPE

The Council has authorised the purchase of an astronomical telescope for viewing of stars, planets etc. The telescope will arrive late in November and will be for controlled use at Lake Ballard and probably some other locations.

Shire staff will manage the use of the telescope and interested people will be welcome to travel with us to the viewing sites. Menzies has some excellent sites and I am sure our magnificent night skies will be a real treat. Hopefully we will also attract more tourists to Menzies especially those involved in the increasingly popular astrotourism.

SHIRE BUS

The Shire bus which seats eleven passengers is now operating and is available for hire under control of the Works Supervisor. A Policy, Agreement and fee structure has been approved by the Council to manage the use of the bus.

ILLEGAL BUILDING

There has been some controversy over the Council's actions it has taken regarding an illegal building in the Menzies townsite. Regulations for buildings are made by the State Government and the Shire cannot pick and choose what it decides to enforce and what to ignore. There is no option for the Shire – the State makes the laws – the Shire is compelled to enforce them.

It has be said that the building is not causing anyone any harm but unfortunately this is not how the law sees it — there are implications for the Shire if anyone is ever injured because of an illegal structure, especially if the Shire has not attempted to address a matter it knows exists. It could also lead to other people refusing to comply with the Building Act and if the Council ignores one, it can be difficult to enforce those same laws on others.

It is a slippery slope if the Council does not enforce the State Building Act in this and any other instance.

CATTLE IN THE TOWNSITE

The Council has directed me to commence negotiations with the owners of the stations that adjoin the town common boundary to make a joint agreement to fence the town common. This is intended to keep cattle out of the town, stop them invading private gardens, damaging trees and keeping them out of the Caravan Park. The Shire will fund the fencing products and hopefully, the station owners will erect the fencing.

It will take some months for this to occur and before we get to the point where a fence can be funded and then constructed.

CHRISTMAS HOLIDAY

Shire services will be closing for the Christmas break on Friday 20th December and recommencing on Monday 6th January 2020.


There will be some employees remaining in the Shire to carry out the essential services and to address any urgent matters that may come up during that time.

In Memory of Councillor **Ian Tucker**



12 August 1951-05 October 2019

lan was born in Coolgardie, one of eight children. He had four brothers and three sisters, however one brother died at only six months of age. When lan was about five years old the family moved to Laverton. His father cut and carted Sandlewood. It was here that lan started school, but he ended up doing correspondence school with his sister.


The family moved to Leonora and it was during this time when lan was about nine or ten that his father passed. After this he moved to Gwalia where he attended school for a couple of years. When the mine closed the family moved to Kalgoorlie. Ian finished school at Kalgoorlie Central and Eastern Goldfields High. He finished school at fourteen. The day he turned fourteen he moved to Esperance to work. Mr John Peddler operated a boy's hostel in Esperance and he assisted boys into employment. Ian started working at Florissons Furniture Store which is still operating today. After four months in Esperance he got homesick and he and another young lad called Chris Johnson hitchhiked back to Kalgoorlie. He moved between Kalgoorlie where his mother and sisters lived and Orabanda where his brothers were working at the Battery.

When he was about fifteen or sixteen he bought his first car and drove up to Menzies to visit one of his sisters. He started seeing Joan Brennan when he was about seventeen or eighteen although they had

known each other since school. They married and had their first son Rodney in Kalgoorlie before moving to Menzies.

lan worked on the railways between Kalgoorlie and Leonora for ten years but spent his final three months in Kalgoorlie. He tells the story of how when the Minister was heading up here to 'open the line' he had to knock the last dog spikes into the sleeper and then remove it so that the Minister could appear to hit

it in when the media were watching. After leaving the railways he worked at the Menzies Battery for six years



lan was an ASCIC Commissioner for two years, had been a member of the Goldfields Land and Sea Council for more than twenty years and when Dianne Logan took over as Chairperson in 2001 he had been the longest-serving Chairman of the Council. Ian had been on the Lake Ballard Management Advisory Committee since 2002, and a Shire of Menzies Councillor for over 14 years. He had been involved with the WA Aboriginal Legal Services for twelve years and is also one of the Sir Antony Gormley installations on Lake Ballard.

HOW TO PROTECT AGAINST

* FIGHT the BITE *

Prevent mosquito bites





COVER UP

Wear long, loose-fitting, light coloured clothing, covering as much of the body as you can. Mosquitoes can bit through tight clothes like jeans. Make sure children are also covered up.



REPEL

Use insect repellent containing DEET (diethyltouluamide) or picaridin and always follow instructions on the label.



CLEAN UP

Stop mosquitoes breeding in water pooling around your home or holiday accommodation by emptying water from











SEVEN GOLDEN RULES FOR **PROSPECTING**

Put safety first

Make sure you have enough water, fuel, maps and first aid supplies.

Give serious consideration to taking some form of telecommunications and a global positioning system to fix locations, and a Personal Locator Beacon (PLB)

— it may turn out to be your most important safety device.

Obtain a Miner's Right permit when prospecting on vacant Crown land (\$25 from any Mining Registrar's office).

Obtain a 40E permit

prior to prospecting within an exploration tenement (if you don't have written permission from the tenement holder).

Get written permission from the tenement holder when prospecting on:

- a mining lease an exploration licence (if you don't have a 40E permit) a prospecting licence

Comply with all legal requirements when prospecting on a pastoral lease. You cannot prospect within 100 metres of any occupied building or within 400 metres of any livestock watering point without the consent of the pastoralist.

Show respect when on Crown land because it is used by other people or set aside for many purposes.

Fill any holes that you dug and repair ground that has been disturbed.

1080 BAITING IN THIS AREA IS A RISK TO DOMESTIC PETS

Please be advised that baiting programs using 1080 poison are carried out across Western Australia, including this area, and are aimed at controlling wild dogs, feral cats, feral pigs, foxes and rabbits. The poison baits remain toxic for many months. You need to exercise caution. Domestic pets should be kept close and under control at all times. Owners may consider the use of leads and muzzles for their domestic pets.

1080 baiting is part of an integrated pest management program protecting livestock from death and injury; reducing the impact on pastoral and agricultural production; and helping to preserve the unique flora and fauna of WA. Baits are not intentionally laid in public areas such as road reserves, parking bays, rest stops or roadhouses however can be inadvertently moved into these areas by animals and birds.



Prohibited Burning Period: From 1 November 2019 to 15 March 2020 (inclusive)

All burning, including garden refuse is prohibited during this period. Properties to be maintained clear of flammable material until 15 March 2019.

Restricted Burning Periods 2: From 16 March 2020 to 30 April 2020 (inclusive)

Permits to burn are required during this period for hazard reduction burning.

Please note that penalties apply where burning regulations are contravened or permit conditions are not complied with.

Certain climate or weather conditions may cause these periods to be extended or shortened.

REMEMBRANCE DAY FACTS AND INFORMATION

Remembrance Day (also known as Armistice Day or Poppy Day)

What is Remembrance Day?

Remembrance Day is a memorial day which takes place every year so that countries in the Commonwealth can remember members of the armed forces who have fought and died serving their country.

When is Remembrance Day?

Remembrance Day is always 11th November (11/11). It was on the 11th hour of the 11 day of the 11th month, that combat in World War I came to an end in 1918.

Remembrance Day has been observed since 1919.

Why do we wear poppies on Remembrance Day?

The poppy became the symbol of Remembrance day because it was one of the first flowers to bloom on the battlefields of Flanders during World War 1. Their bright red colour symbolized the blood shed during the horrific conflict, but also the hope of new life.

The Remembrance Day poppy has been used as a symbol since 1920. Today, poppies are worn on clothing in the days leading up to Remembrance Day, and poppy wreaths are placed on the war memorials. This is why Remembrance Day is often known as Poppy Day.

Why do we have Remembrance Day?

Remembrance Day is an opportunity to pay respect to and honour those who fought and died serving their country. It also gives the public a chance to remember family and friends who lost their lives during wars. Finally, it gives people a chance to consider the cost of war.

Why do people wear white poppies or purple poppies?

White poppies are worn by pacifists who oppose all conflict and war as a way of promoting peace. Purple poppies are produced by a charity called Animal Aid and remind people that animals also lost their lives during the wars.

History Snippets of the Melbourne Cup



Frederick Standish, member of the Victorian Turf Club and steward on the day of the first Cup was credited with forming the idea to hold a horse race and calling it the "Melbourne Cup". On Thursday 7 November 1861 seventeen horses contested the first Melbourne Cup, racing for the 'winner takes all' modest prize of £710 cash and a hand-beaten gold watch.

The winner of the first Melbourne Cup race was a 16.3 hand bay stallion by the name of Archer in a time of 3.52.00 ridden by John Cutts (believed to be the first aboriginal Jockey) and trained by Etienne de Mestre.

It has become legend that Archer walked over 800km (over 500 miles) to Flemington from de Mestre's stable at "Terara" near Nowra, New South Wales. However, newspaper archives of the day reveal that he had travelled south from Sydney to Melbourne on the steamboat called 'City of Melbourne', together with de Mestre, and two of de Mestre's other horses Exeter and Inheritor. Before being winched aboard the steamboat for the trip to Melbourne, the horses had arrived in Sydney in September 1861.



In '1865, Adam Lindsay Gordon wrote a verse in which the Melbourne Cup winner was called Tim Whiffler. Two years later in 1867 two horse with the name Tim Whiffler ran in the Melbourne Cup. (In 1866 two horses with name of Falcon also run in the Melbourne Cup.) To distinguish between the two Tim Whifflers they were called "Sydney" Tim Whiffler and "Melbourne" Tim Whiffler and "Sydney" Tim Whiffler actually won the Cup.


The First Melbourne cup to be held on a Tuesday was in 1895.






