President's Message



The greening of our area has been a welcome sight. However, along with the rain, we have also experienced some challenges, particularly in the form of damage to our roads.

During a recent visit to Niagara Dam, while it looked fantastic, I was deeply concerned about the water leakage through the dam wall. Niagara Dam stands as an iconic symbol of our region. It will be on my list of high priority work to get completed as we cannot lose such an icon for our area.

I have engaged with relevant ministers at both the state and federal levels to advocate for funding to improve Oak Valley road on behalf of the Tjuntjuntjara community.

On 8 March, I attended the Northern Goldfields Working Group (NGWG) meeting in Leonora. The main points of discussion were on strategies to promote the sustainable growth and prosperity of our Northern Goldfields region.

On 18 March, I attended a Budget workshop at the Shire Council chambers. This workshop was instrumental in shaping our financial priorities and ensuring that our resources are allocated efficiently to meet the needs of our community.

On 22 March, I participated in the Goldfields Voluntary Regional Organisation of Councils (GVROC) meeting via Teams, which was hosted in Esperance.

While it is not far from Easter, please drive safe and have a very Happy Easter.

Works Report (to 22 March)



The past two months have seen extraordinary rainfall figures, particularly in the Kookynie region.

Mt Remarkable Road and Malcolm Road were the worst affected by the late January rain with high damage also on Kookynie Yarri Road.

To date Mt Remarkable Road and Kookynie Yarri Road from Cranky Jack Road to Yarri Road are not fit to travel and further report will be made. Kookynie Road itself was covered by silt in 18 places.

Our contract grader has been working on Kookynie Yarri Road to Cranky Jack intersection, then Cranky Jack Road, then Yarri Road. The Western side of the Highway did not experience anywhere near as bad damage and our grader operator has recently completed Evanston Road up to Bullfinch Road,. My thanks go to David McQuie who repaired washouts near Cashmere Downs and to Aurenne Mining who repaired a section of Mt Ida Road.

In town we have been experiencing delays in garbage collection as we await delivery of a new hydraulic pump. This has been dispatched from Perth and should arrive shortly. In the meantime staff have been using both our waste truck and utilities to collect garbage.

The wet weather has also resulted in heavy weed and grass growth around town and crews are not keeping up with the growth. Hopefully this will be helped by the fact that we have employed a gardener to work on gardens and lawns. The gardener is also working on improving the look of the town by improving garden beds.

We are waiting on priced prior to ordering a hard cover for the water park and a new sail for the playground area.

We have also been carrying out improvements, including fencing, to various council properties. Our Building Maintenance Officer has also been heavily involved with restoration of the Town Hall and CRC building.

Raubex/Roads2000 are currently carrying out road widening to Goldfields Highway between Menzies and Cane Grass Swamp and, at the request of Main Roads, are using Depot grounds for their own office buildings. They have their own padlock access to the Depot yard.

Shire of Menzies hopes to have chosen the contractor by August, with works to begin by the end of 2024




The Community Bus will be leaving from the Shire of Menzies office every Thursday at 7am.

In The Garden — Warren

In The Garden April.

Did you hear it?

Did you smell it?

Did you dance to it?

Did your driveway flood?

All in all the rain gave us something to smile about and made for a welcome change in conversation across the neighbourhood. The plants in our gardens are still singing away happily after the long awaited rainfall and of course growing like weeds. Indeed some are weeds. When you arrive into our township it is now a field of green that welcomes you, not just the red dirt, and it continues all throughout our Shire.

A Wonderful way to start Autumn.

This month we feature a most adaptive, resourceful and innovative gardener. Warren took on the challenge of saving some already established trees on his block that through years of neglect looked likely to remain stunted, or worse. However, with daily watering and the addition of some soil conditioning and TLC his trees have resurrected themselves, rewarding him with new foliage, flowers and developing fruit.

The standout would have to be the Fiddlewood trees, after months of watering they now shade the new Pot garden beautifully. As you can see by the photo we have a recycling guru showcasing some of his ideas of what makes garden beds or planters boxes. Old baths have now become wicking beds. Tyres are 'in' again, just like the old days... painted and then filled to the brim with plants...although he hasn't made any swans! Old poly pipe cut and painted with some artistic flair now displays a wonderful feature at the front of the garden, planted out with a mix of herbs and flowers and the bird bath completes the idyllic scene.

At his recycling best is Warren's awesome shade house constructed from poly pipe, tin and covered in shade cloth (90% blockout). This houses a raised garden bed, again all constructed from found objects and growing inside an abundance of thriving Snow peas, cucumbers, tomatoes, basil, Vietnamese mint, radishes and also a strawberry plant (that still is fruiting even though we had all those 40c days)! Naturally this shade house also houses his seedling trays to which will be invaluable when we finally get the cold frosty days ahead.

Amazingly all of Warren's garden and its features are above ground, using recycled containers of many and varied types, all put to good use as a plant holder of some sort.

What about the Avocado tree also in a pot, Warren germinated this himself from a seed and it now looks in great health. So does the mandarin tree.



However there is one mystery plant that is in the ground and that has really benefited from the care and regular watering and that is this amazing little succulent. It has been divided and replanted wherever Warren has found space, under trees and in pots, even in a crack in the concrete paving. What a survivor. On one plant alone there are now 18 blooms that basically open daily to reveal this wildly pretty, 5 petaled, deep burgundy flower. It has been blooming continuously for the past 4 months. What a legend.....just like its Gardener.
