Acting CEO's Message

Welcome to the March edition of Menzies Matters.

The GROH Housing project took a big step forward with the delivery of the

two new housing units from Modular last week. The houses are now on site with the septic systems installed and the power connection in the pipeline. That connection may be a little slower in completion but the project should be complete within the financial year.

The Skate Park project is progressing with design work continuing and a likely construction timeframe of April/May.

It was good to see a number of residents turn up for the Strategic Community Planning workshop hosted by Jess from Moore Australia. There were some great suggestions that came from the workshop and from here on the process will be for the Council to have a workshop which will help to identify what resources are available to undertake some of the items and projects put forward.

There was also a good turnout for the Annual Electors Meeting and while there were a few items brought up in General business (see minutes) no motions were put forward for consideration by Council.

Council approved the sale of 56 Ballard Street and 106 and 108 Suiter Street in Menzies. The Council is required to advertise the proposed disposals and there is an ad in the MM this month regarding the two sales. Please feel free to make comment if you have any issues with these sales.

The Council completed its midyear budget review at the February meeting, it also reviewed its annual compliance return, reviewed its Delegations Register and updated its risk register. Several policies were also reviewed as is normally the case.

Finally my term as Acting CEO has been extended to June during which time I am hopeful that the recruitment process can begin for a full time replacement.



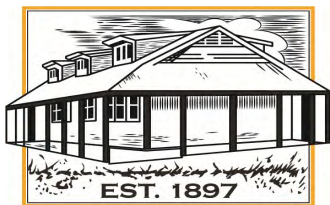

The highlight?

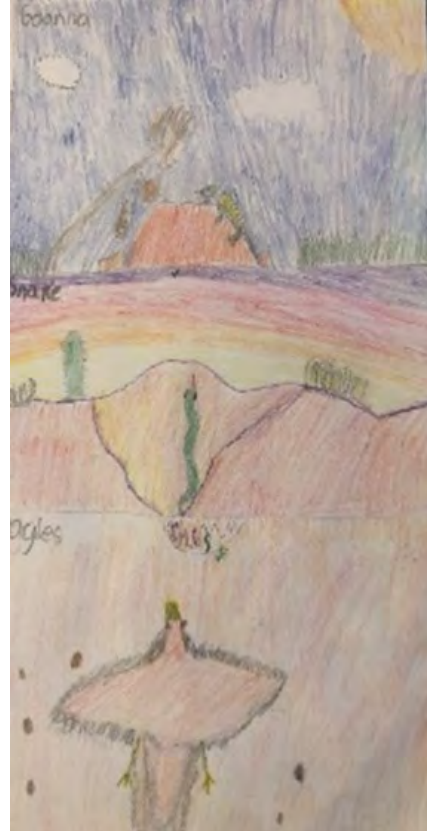
A giant slide that has delivered endless thrills and excitement, making it an instant favourite among the students. Scan the QR code and experience the excitement for yourself!

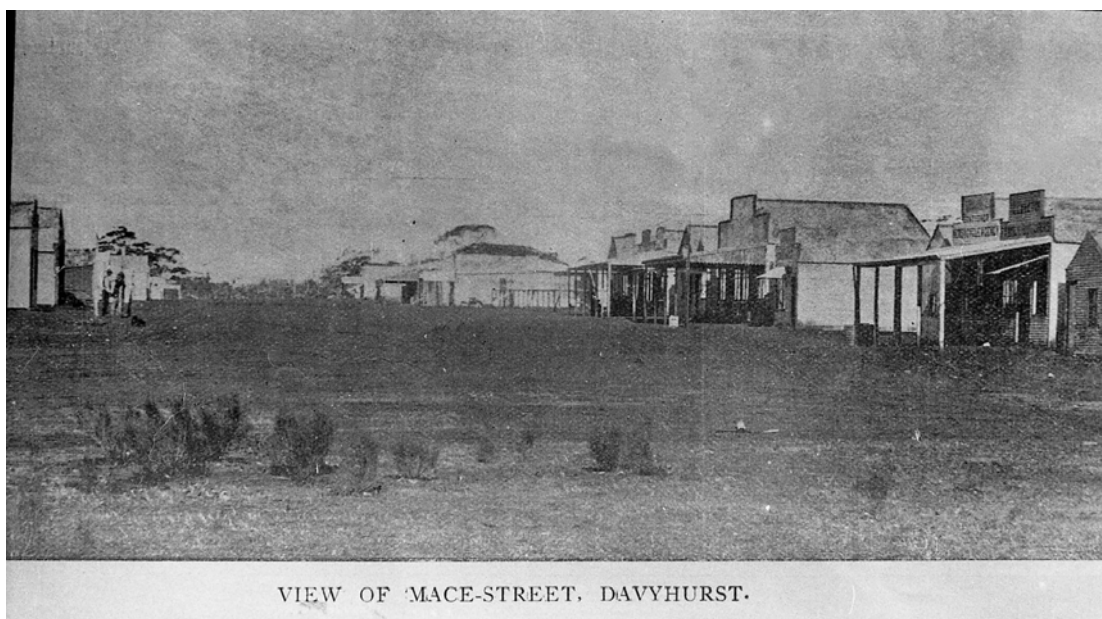
Davyhurst

Davyhurst, now a ghost town located southwest of Menzies, was officially gazetted in 1901. The proposed town site was initially named Davyston in 1890. However, Warden Owen of Menzies informed the Department that the town site was better known as Davyhurst, named after Watty Davys. The main street was named Mace, after two of his partners.

In 1899, Watty Davys and his companions travelled from Broad Arrow and discovered the Welcome Mine. However, due to the small size of the quartz leader, Davys began prospecting in the surrounding bush. After exploring several promising locations, he found three reefs on a hillside feature known as the Waihi (with Davys being a New Zea-

lander). The lease was registered in Menzies on November 18, 1899. The team quickly began work on the lease and sent the ore to a battery at Cal- lion for testing. While there were other mines in the area, it soon became apparent that the Waihi was especially valuable. The government subsequently declared Davyhurst a town, and it quickly developed into a thriving community with various amenities, including stores, three hotels, a school, a church, a bakehouse, and a government mining office. At one point, the school had an attendance of sixty children, and a reliable dam provided an adequate water supply.

Davyhurst was an important gold-mining town for many years, with records indicating it produced 180,000 tons of ore, yielding 130,000 ounces of gold.

KOOKYNIE.

Oct. 8. Last night an adjourned meeting of the council was held in the Council Chamber. -There were present: The Mayor, Crs. Natt, Nielsen, Manton, O'Connor, Walker, and Ebsary. A resolution was passed regarding a letter from the Kookynie Athletic Club that the council take over the recreation reserve, and the finance committee was requested to report on the matter. In answer to an application from W. Patterson to erect swimming baths, the council decided to grant the application, provided plans and specifications were submitted and approved.

Kalgoorlie Western Argus, Tuesday 14 October 1902

A general meeting of the municipal council was held last night. Plans and specifications were submitted by Mr. W. Patterson for the erection of baths. It was agreed to grant the application, provided a small alteration was made in the structure.

Kalgoorlie Miner, Saturday 25 October 1902

KOOKYNIE.

On Wednesday last the formal opening of the baths owned by the Kookynie Baths Company took place, the event being celebrated by an aquatic carnival. The programme consisted of handicaps, sweepstakes, boys' races and other events. The mayor (Mr. T. Campbell) presented two gold medals, one for the 100yds. championship and one for the Mayoral Sweeps stake, 200 yards. Mr. Thomas Britton also presented a gold medal for the 50yds. Handicap. The baths are proving a success to the enterprising proprietors, Patterson and Co. They are supplied by a continuous stream of clean water from the Cosmopolitan mine.

A number of ladies, and gentlemen paid a visit of inspection to the Kookynie baths on Thursday afternoon, when they were pronounced ready for the swimming season. Beware of this sneaky tactic when booking your next holiday

One way to get over post-holiday blues is to book another holiday. It'll give you something exciting to look forward to when the daily grind is getting you down. However, as you start searching for a great deal on your next getaway be on high alert for a sneaky practice that could blow your budget.

Drip pricing is a tactic used by websites or apps to trick or manipulate you into spending more money than you'd planned. It happens when an attractive price is advertised at the beginning of an online purchase, but then extra fees and charges (such as booking and service fees, insurances) are gradually added during the purchase process. It can also include pre-selected extras you may not want, and add-ons presented in a way that makes you feel you must buy them.

This type of pricing tactic is commonly seen when purchasing flights, event tickets, accommodation or rental cars. All the things you're likely to need for that exciting holiday.

When you have to manually un-tick and opt-out of the pre-selected extras before you get to the final price, you're more likely to get caught out by drip pricing. And when you end up paying more than intended or you felt misled about the price – then you've experienced consumer harm.

To prevent being stung extra through sneaky drip pricing, remind yourself about the deal you saw on the flashy ad that drew you in.

Stick to your holiday budget. When you start the online booking process, prepare to back out if the final price is not what you were expecting and shop around for a better final price.

As you move through each screen during the booking process, keep your eyes peeled for any pre-selections. Deselect anything you don't want and double check again before you hit that final pay button.

Under the Australian Consumer Law (ACL), businesses are only allowed to add pre-selected charges and fees if the additional prices are disclosed at the beginning of the purchasing process. Otherwise, their advertising could be considered misleading.

If you are misled into paying an optional charge, then raise this with the business and request a pro-rata refund to the value of that added charge.

If you believe a business is breaching the rules on pre-selected fees and charges contact Consumer Protection on 1300 30 40 54, or consumer@demirs.wa.gov.au for advice.

Looking to book a holiday house? Make sure the short-term rental accommodation (STRA) registration number is displayed on the ad. This lets you know that the host has complied with new rules for operating STRA in WA. You can also check that a STRA registration number is valid, and the postcode of the STRA matches the location that you are booking for. This may help to identify illegitimate ads. Check if a STRA is registered via wa.gov.au

I recently read the results of the visit to Canberra by our council.

Money was allocated to many regional areas. Port Hedland, Roeborne and a few others regional areas, I think Esperance was another town from memory. But what I recall is that Menzies did not receive a cent. I can only imagine that the reason is because of the size of our population. Now if I'm wrong then perhaps our authority needs to expose the secret.

Another piece of news is the proposed tree planting project that was announced by the state government. I understand that Menzies is included. Tree planting has many benefits. Settling dust is one of them. I'm told that the Kalgoorlie Shire planted many trees years ago for that same reason.

I'm aware that our shire has been active in tree planting in the past but to maintain the necessary watering has been a challenge.

Perhaps we can all help by planting a street tree in front of our house and care for it, if there isn't one. There is a dead tree in Kensington street that used to flower. Unfortunately, it was not watered during last summer and the eucalyptus has died.

Recently there was a Facebook note advertising buildings from sea containers. Many were interested. I should have typed a note but didn't so I hope our Menzies Matters will inform some of those who were interested. The particular drawing indicated a number of containers placed above each other. This particular configuration is very expensive due to the cost of cranes, especially in a remote town. One person wanted a "cheap block" of land. Menzies has that advantage. Visit the town and ask the administration. While in town visit a few sites where containers have been used as houses. I might add that containers are forbidden on domestic blocks in Kalgoorlie.
