





What's Up in the Night Sky? November is Time for Galaxy Hunting

Have you ever seen something that is 2.5 million light years away from Earth? November is your chance!

The Andromeda Galaxy is in our local group of galaxies, a neighbour of our home galaxy, the Milky Way. Research from the University of Western Australia node of the International Centre for Radio Astronomy Research estimates that Andromeda is the same size as the Milky Way or perhaps even slightly smaller.

A dark night sky is essential to see Andromeda, as it is a very faint object, and it will appear as a very small and faint smudge. The best time to see it is between 12th to 22nd November. At 9pm, the sky will be dark with no moonlight. Look directly north and find the brighter star called Mirach (see the image, right). Andromeda is a bit lower and to the left of Mirach, about 15° above the horizon.

A good tip is to use "averted vision" to see Andromeda from your peripheral eyesight. Don't look directly at Andromeda, instead look a little off to one side. Apps like SkySafari or Stellarium have a compass tool that can also help guide you across the night sky to find Andromeda's location.

As regional WA residents, you can be very proud of our dark night sky. It's a view that has disappeared in many places around the world. Your local community is working with Astrotourism WA to share and protect our beautiful night sky.




During this time the garden transforms into a vibrant tapestry of colors and textures, a dramatic contrast to the rugged environment.

The image is of Thomas William Murphy's Wayside Inn. He was granted his license in 1897, conditional on the house being completed.




DRINK MENZIES BEER.

Advertisement from The North Coolgardie Herald 1899 -Menzies Brewery Co. Is prepared to supply first class beer at lower rates than any other brewery and deliver in cellars if required. Keep your money in your own district. Customers can rely upon a safe and good drink, as only the best quality of material is used. Special facilities for supplying orders from outside districts.

The Menzies Brewery

The brewery, the property of the Menzies Brewery Company, situated about 2 miles east of Menzies, and in what is known as the Picton basin, was erected there owing to the fairly good supply of fresh water obtained in two shafts which were sunk to a depth of 100 and 90 feet respectively. This brewery was formerly owned by a syndicate, the capital being 16 shares of £100 each—£1600. With this limited amount Mr. W. J. Suiter undertook on behalf of the syndicate to start a small 6 hogshead plant, and although freights at that time cost over £50 per ton from Fremantle, he succeeded in completing buildings and plant and got out beer within the amount. There were efforts made soon after by two different parties to float two brewery companies. Owing to the promoters requiring so much paid-up interest and cash out of the concerns they fell to the ground. The syndicate fearing that another company might be formed floated their brewery into a limited liability company with a capital of £20.000 in 20,000 shares of £1 each, 9s 6d having been called up. The company however have not been successful in their choice of brewers; the first one obtained was none too skilful, and being incapacitated on several occasions through sickness, caused the beer to be indifferent at times. His services were dispensed with, and Mr. W J. Suiter was urged to accept the temporary position of brewer until a successor could be procured. Mr. Moyes, a brewer from Victoria, was chosen; but he too did not make much improvement in matters.

Consequently there was a great falling off in the trade; the public not caring too much for the local article caused the hotel proprietors to send to Coolgardie for supplies. Mr. Moyes was in consequence allowed to resign and again Mr. Suiter was requested to take temporary charge until another brewer be secured. It redounds to Mr. Suiter's credit and to his skill as a brewer and

brewery engineer that: during each time he undertook the duties he succeeded in making beer that suited the palates of the Menzies beerdrinkers. As a proof of this during the last seven days the output from the brewery has exceeded the output of any one of the last three months; and, indeed, the present month promises to exceed the total of the last three months. Mr. Suiter has not only succeeded in producing a first-class beer, but has had many improvements to the brewery and plant carried out. He designed the buildings and plant and done nearly the whole of the mechanical work himself. A new cellar, 50ft by 26ft, has been added to the first buildings, and a large storeroom. The fermenting room has been considerably enlarged, an engine room erected, and a 6 h.p. Soho engine built in. A 10 h.p. steel boiler provides the steam; the shafting and pulleys were procured from Robison Bros., Melbourne; the boiler, engine, and a steam Tangye pump from Bennie, Teare and Co., Coolgardie; a deep well double action force pump has been connected with the engine, and a splendid malt mill, capable of crushing 120 bushels of malt per hour, has been fitted up. These several improvements together with a large copper boiler, 1400 gallon capacity, built in and at work, makes the plant the most complete of any on the goldfields, and providing the water holds out, there are ample facilities for brewing about 150 hogsheads per week. We understand that negotiations have been entered into with a Mr. A. Walmsley to fill the position of brewer, but as he has to come from Ipswich, Queensland, it will be some little time before he can arrive here to take over charge. Meantime Mr Suiter, at no little sacrifice to himself, will continue the temporary management. The second dividend of 6d per share is now due and payable at the company's office, and the present outlook indicates future dividends regu-

Community Information on Cyanide Use at Tropicana Mine Site

Responsible Cyanide Management

At AngloGold Ashanti's **Tropicana** mine, we are dedicated to ensuring the safe use and management of all chemicals, including cyanide, which is critical to our gold extraction process. We recognise our responsibility to protect the environment and community through best practices and safety measures.

What is Cyanide?

Cyanide refers to a group of chemicals containing carbon and nitrogen, with **sodium cyanide** being the most common form used in gold mining. Sodium cyanide is transported in liquid form for immediate use.

Why We Use Cyanide

Gold does not dissolve in water alone due to its properties as a noble metal. Therefore addition of cyanide is essential for extracting gold from ore through a process called **cyanidation**. The gold is then captured on activated carbon within large mechanically agitated tanks, then subsequently processed and refined.

Transportation of Cyanide to Tropicana Mine

Cyanide is transported to the Tropicana mine in specially designed **isotainers** to ensure safe delivery. These containers are built to withstand severe damage. The transportation follows the highest safety standards and regulations under the **Dangerous Goods Act**. All drivers are trained in cyanide management and accredited to transport dangerous goods. The transportation of cyanide to Tropicana occurs via a Supply Chain that is certified under the International Cyanide Management Code.

Environmental Breakdown

Cyanide is broken down in sunlight into harmless byproducts like carbon dioxide and nitrogen. It does not accumulate in living organisms, and in the unlikely event of a spill, cyanide quickly evaporates or breaks down, minimising its environmental impact.

Tropicana Mine's Actions to Minimise Cyanide Risks

At Tropicana mine, we adopt a series of proactive measures to reduce risks associated with cyanide use:

- Regular maintenance of equipment used in cyanide handling.
- Independently certified compliance with the International Cyanide Management Code, ensuring the highest safety and environmental standards.
- Fauna protection, excluding animals from areas with cyanide-containing water.
- Optimising cyanide usage through continuous process control and technical improvement.
- Minimising worker exposure through exclusion zones, personal and static cyanide gas monitors, alarms, appropriate personal protective equipment, and high alkalinity levels to prevent the formation of hydrogen cyanide gas.
- Regular training of staff and contractors on the safe use of cyanide.
- Continuous monitoring of cyanide throughout the cyanide facilities.

Emergency Preparedness

In the event of a cyanide emergency at Sunrise Dam, we have implemented:

- A robust **Emergency Management Plan**, including regular drills.
- Accredited Hazmat response teams for immediate intervention.
- Collaboration with external agencies such as DFES and WA Police for emergency assistance

As the employer, it is the duty of AGAA to provide and maintain a working environment where, so far as is practicable, employees are not exposed to hazards. As part of this accountability, AGAA is responsible for managing all the chemicals used onsite in a manner that protects its employees, contractors and the environment. One of the ways we achieve this is by making this fact sheet available to all stakeholders to ensure you are aware of our cyanide management activities.

WHAT IS CYANIDE?

Cyanide is a chemical that can be deadly. It comes in the form of a colourless gas or crystal. Cyanide may have "a bitter almond" smell, but it does not always give off an odour, and not everyone can detect this odour.

Cyanide can enter the water, soil or air as a result of both natural and industrial activities. It is found in cigarette smoke and other combustion products such as plastics. You can be exposed by breathing air, drinking water, eating food, or touching something that has been contaminated with cyanide.

CYANIDE AT OUR SITES

AGAA uses a 30% strength liquid sodium cyanide (NaCN) manufactured by AGR.

A red dye is added to the sodium cyanide to give it a pinkish colour and makes it easy to distinguish from other clear solutions. Liquid sodium cyanide will react with acids, acid salts and carbon dioxide to form Hydrogen Cyanide Gas (HCN).

WHY DOES AGAA USE CYANIDE?

Cyanide has been used to separate gold and silver from ore for over 120 years, making many operations viable that would otherwise

have had to close. Cyanide is also used in the electroplating industries, the tanning industry and in specialized laboratories. A complex cyanide, Prussian blue, is used for dyeing jeans.

At AGAA sites, sodium cyanide is added to the slurry in the leach tanks. The cyanide dissolves the gold out of the ore and into solution and then the gold is adsorbed onto activated carbon. This process is required to recover and purify the gold. A small quantity of sodium cyanide is used in the elution circuit to assist with the stripping of the gold from the carbon back into solution form. Some residual cyanide remains in the slurry and is discharged to the tailings storage facility.

Research continues but to date no alternative gold extraction process has been identified that is environmentally acceptable and economically feasible.

INTERNATIONAL CYANIDE MANAGEMENT CODE

"The Cyanide Code is a voluntary initiative for the gold mining industry and the producers and transporters of the cyanide used in gold mining. It is intended to complement an operation's existing regulatory requirements."

"The Cyanide Code focuses exclusively on the safe management of cyanide that is produced, transported and used for the recovery of gold, and on mill tailings and leach solutions."


AGAA's Operations Sunrise Dam and Tropicana were initially certified in compliance with the Code in 2007 and 2017 respectively, and remains committed to maintaining compliance



RISKS OF USING CYANIDE

Liquid sodium cyanide and HCN gas are extremely toxic and fast acting poisons. Cyanide poisoning occurs through cyanide entering the body by:

- Swallowing sodium cyanide
- Absorption though eyes and skin
- Breathing in HCN gas




The following are risks at AGAA:

- Worker exposure to HCN gas or 30% strength sodium cyanide due to leaks
- Leaks of solution containing cyanide into the environment
- Wildlife interaction with slurry containing cyanide on the tailings storage facility.

WHAT IS AGAA DOING TO REDUCE THE RISKS OF CYANIDE?

Controls to reduce worker exposure to cyanide:

- The Sodium Cyanide is stored in an enclosed tank
- The area is completely fenced off with only authorised entry permitted
- The sodium cyanide tank and pipelines are identified with a lilac colour
- Cyanide is added to the process with specially designed dosing equipment to eliminate human inter-action



- Portable HCN monitors are mandatory in certain areas, these areas are clearly labelled.
- Full face masks with canisters must be worn when workers will be exposed to high HCN gas for an extended period of time.
- Cyanide awareness training is required for workers in the processing plant

Operational controls to manage cyanide include:

- Regular inspections on all cyanide facilities
- Regular maintenance on equipment used for handling cyanide
- Minimising cyanide usage with ongoing optimisation test work.
- Dosing lime into the leach circuit to raise the pH and reduce the generation of HCN gas
- Instrumentation for continuous monitoring

Measures for environmental management are:

- Fencing around the plant and the tailings storage dam
- Secondary containment for all cyanide containing tanks and pipelines which can contain 110% of the volume of the biggest tank in that containment
- Monitoring bores around the plant and the tailings storage facility to sample water quality and water levels
- AGAA uses saline water, considered too salty to drink by most wildlife
- Available funds for decontamination at the end of the mine life

To reduce the risk of a cyanide emergency event the following management strategies are available:

- Trained Emergency Response Team

Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan




