Shire President's Report

November included several key meetings and discussions focused on the ongoing development and improvement of our Shire

and the region

On 10 November, I participated in a tourism enhancement discussion in Menzies with Peter Bentley, Acting CEO, Sean McGay, Community Development Manager and Ross MacCulloch, Goldfields Tourism Development Manager, Australia's Golden Outback. We focused on how we can better promote our region's tourism attractions, improve the visitor experience, and identify opportunities for growth in this area.

On 14 November, Peter Bentley, Cr Dwyer, and I attended the Goldfields Voluntary Regional Organisation of Councils (GVROC) meeting in Leonora. Following that, Peter Bentley and I attended a meeting with the Northern Goldfields Working Group. Both meetings were productive discussions focused on regional development and collaboration.

On 20 November, I, along with other available councillors and Shire staff, attended the Shire of Menzies exit meeting for the Annual Financial Report with the auditors and a representative from the Office of the Auditor General. The results were outstanding, reflecting strong financial management and commitment. Congratulations to all staff for a job exceptionally well done.

On 21 November, Peter Bentley, Cr Dwyer, and I attended the Main Roads Regional Road Group (RRG) meeting in Kalgoorlie. It was a great opportunity to hear updates from all Goldfields shires, Main Roads, WALGA, and RoadWise. I am humbled to have been elected as Chair of the RRG and would like to thank my colleagues for their confidence and support.

Finally, I'd like to congratulate Kristy Van Kuyl, Chief Financial Officer, on being named joint winner of the LG Pro Member of the Year award. This is a well-deserved recognition of Kristy's dedication and contribution in local government.

EV Charging Station The order has been issued for the provision of an EV charging station in Menzies and the project will be completed in early 2026.

Water Projects The Shire secured some significant funding assistance for the provision of extra tanks located near the southern tree project which will help with water storage from Council building runoff and the Bitumen dam. In addition, Watercorp are in the process of transferring management of the concrete dam and its bore field to the Shire which will also provide water for further greening projects including potential for the oval to be reinvigorated. This should go a long way to providing a cool green space within the townsite and will be a much appreciated addition to our recreation facilities.





What's Up in the Night Sky?

Best Meteor Shower of the Year!

If you're into meteor showers, this is the one for you! The Geminids can be seen earlier in the night than many other showers and there's a prediction of large numbers of meteors. This makes it quite the spectacle.

When and where to look:

The peak of about 120 meteors/hour is from 11pm on 14th December. Viewing is to the north east about 20-45 degrees above the horizon. The Moon will rise at 1.10am (AWST) on 15th December, so viewing prior to this will be best. The Moon is less bright the next night which could improve viewing. There's a 3D model to see at https://www.meteorshowers.org/view/Geminids.

What is a meteor shower?

A meteor (commonly called a "shooting star") is an unexpected, brief streak of light seen in our night sky. It's caused when space debris, travelling up to 75km per second, enters Earth's atmosphere. The debris can be as small as a grain of sand which burns up in the atmosphere and causes a bright streak of light to appear briefly in our night sky.

A meteor shower is a celestial spectacle where large numbers of meteors, or "shooting stars", streak across the night sky. These dazzling events occur when Earth passes through the trail of debris left by a comet or other object that has come into our Solar System and orbited around the Sun. Visible to the naked eye, meteor showers offer a mesmerising display of bright streaks, adding a touch of cosmic wonder to the night.

<u>Peace of mind or piece of junk.</u> <u>Is shipping insurance worth it?</u>

Have you been online shopping recently and noticed a sneaky little shipping insurance charge at the checkout? Maybe it was preselected for you to opt-out or you could have been lucky enough to be using an online retailer who hadn't yet crossed over to using dark patterns designed to trick you. Either way, this used to be something only the seller paid for, but it's slowly making its way into consumers' carts claiming to offer you protection and peace of mind if something goes wrong after the item is posted. Shipping insurance is like the "extended warranty" of the online retail world. That means you're probably paying extra for protection the Australian Consumer Law (ACL) already gives you. If your item arrives broken, is delivered to the wrong house, is stolen from the doorstep or it never arrives at all, you can rely on your trusty consumer rights.

Unfortunately, many people believe or are told by the retailer that they need to take up any delivery issues with Australia Post or the courier service. This is wrong.

The online retailer is responsible. They are the ones who hold the contract with the courier service. In other words – they are the customer of the courier service, and you are the customer of the retailer. You have absolutely no consumer relationship with the courier.

When there is an issue with the delivery, the retailer is obliged to offer you a remedy such as a repair, refund or replacement and these rights apply regardless of whether shipping insurance was purchased.

If an online retailer tells you otherwise, they could be breaking the law.

There are some steps you can take to protect yourself, especially with the busy Christmas postage season ahead. When placing an order, confirm the timeframe for delivery or if possible, a set date. Keep a record of your transaction by saving or printing your order confirmation, invoice or receipt.

If the item arrives broken, depending on the extent of the damage, you may be entitled to a refund, repair or replacement. The retailer should also cover the return postage costs. Before you return the product to the seller, take a photo of the damage for your own records. As with any consumer issues, contact the retailer and attempt to resolve it with them first. If that gets you nowhere consider seeking a charge back on your credit card via your bank or payment provider. This highlights the importance of only paying through secure methods, our advice is to never pay via bank transfer as you often cannot get your money back.

Remember, businesses who supply within or to Australia must send the goods within a reasonable amount of time or within a timeframe they have indicated, and they must supply a product of acceptable quality. These are your consumer rights. However, the law is much harder to enforce internationally, so keep this in mind when doing your online shopping. If you're still unsure about whether shipping insurance is worth the extra dough, read the terms and conditions to find out what protection it offers you above and beyond your automatic consumer rights.

If your complaint involves Australia Post or Star Track you can lodge a formal complaint with the Postal Industry Ombudsman.

MENZIES. A CHRISTMAS SPOILED.

At the Police Court today Sydney Matthews, a prisoner undergoing a sentence of four months' imprisonment, imposed at Mount Malcolm in September last for larceny, was charged at the Police Court with bringing intoxicating liquor into gaol, and with having housebreaking implements in his possession. The evidence showed that on Christmas Day Matthew was sent to do work at the stables and taking a favourable opportunity walked across to the Maori Hotel.

Sergeant Mitchell observed Matthews and sent the police constable after him. He was brought back and searched, when a lemonade bottle of whisky was found upon him as well as two pick locks, which undo all locks in the gaol, and 8d in money. Matthews said he found the pick locks that afternoon in an empty tin, and as regards the whisky, he thought he was entitled to a little festivity considering the occasion, especially as he had worked very hard since he had been in prison. The Bench imposed a sentence of 14 days' imprisonment on each charge, cumulative on the sentence he is now undergoing. The Bench commented on the common nature of the locks in the prison that could be opened with such a simple picklock as a bent piece of fencing wire.

MENZIES.

It was asserted that when the railway was extended to Kookynie and Leonora, Menzies would he dead and business people be compelled to move on. The prophets, for once, were quite wrong. Commercial travellers, who have a close and pretty keen insight into trade, say that Menzies is as sound a town as any on the fields. The opening up of the north country has in the main done Menzies more good than harm. The removal of the head of the Eastern goldfields line further north has, of course, taken some of the travelling business away, but other advantages have acted in compensation for this loss, and on the whole the town is as good, if not better, than ever. The lire fiend was busy during the past twelve months and swept away a block or two of buildings. The gaps are rapidly being filled up by substantial brick buildings, well built, and an ornament to the town.

There is one building of which Menzies and its residents are reasonably proud. It is the Town Hall, which is the finest out of Perth, putting the municipal buildings of Kalgoorlie, Boulder and Coolgardie completely in the shade. It has an ornamental front in stone and brick, surmounted by a handsome tower, with a large and imposing main entrance, one side being devoted to the Town Council offices and the other to reading room, etc. Behind the main front is a spacious hall, which is constructed of corrugated iron. There is a large stage. Menzies used to possess only a small place of amusement known as the Maori Hall, but the enterprise of the Municipal

Council has resulted in a fine hall being available for visiting dramatic and musical companies.

NIAGARA.

What was once a flourishing town, with seven hotels doing a roaring trade, and several hundred men on gold, has now become a deserted village. A few small mines are being worked, and the gold won assists to run a hotel or two and the stores. There is. however, a lot of adobe -rod mud -walls standing, stripped of all woodwork, and giving a dismal appearance to the town. The train between Menzies and Kookynie stopped at Niagara Falls Hotel, where a good cup of tea and a scone are supplied to the travellers. The locomotive took a good drink from the large tank built upon piers, which is kept filled by gravitation from Niagara dam. about three miles distant, said to be the largest railway dam on the line. It is always well filled, and water trains are kept running from the tank at the Falls. The land around the tank is very fertile, and vegetables and fruit grow in great abundance as the result of irrigation. The peculiar feature of this country is its large supply of artesian water, which can be easily obtain-ed by sinking a well or erecting a windmill. It has only a small percentage of salt. The feed in the spring was very good, and camels and horses were enjoying the herbage. Niagara does not detain the train very long, a passenger or two alight, and the locomotive steams away to the north.

Although the country is somewhat broken, the railway line has been easily constructed, as scarcely any excavation had to be done, and no cuttings of any size were made for miles. A scoop

KOOKYNIE.

For a town that is only three years of age,
Kookynie shows a great record in progress. The
population within a radius of five miles exceeds
3,000, and the townsmen boast that they have
eclipsed Menzies. In population and general progress, the new town certainly leads easily; in
buildings and town improvements Menzies still
holds its own. Kookynie, however, has the electric
light in a portion of the town, the cables being run
from bouse to house, and not on poles, from the
station at the Cosmopolitan mine. The council
and an electrical firm of contractors are in negotiation for the lighting of the streets, and it is
probable satisfactory arrangements will be made
at an early date.

The town depends mainly upon about half a dozen big mines in the immediate vicinity. The Cosmopolitan Proprietary is the leading mine, which has 50 head of stamps at the battery, and hard by is the Cumberland, which has 20 head in the battery. Both are English companies and have expended money freely in equipping the properties. The area of ground within the boundaries of the Cosmopolitan Proprietary is large, and there is ample scope for creating subsidiary companies as occasion may occur. The water pumped from the mine has a volume of about 200,000 gallons per day, and as it is almost fresh, it is good enough for stock purposes, and, if boiled, may be used for human consumption. It is pro-

posed to build a swimming baths to be supplied by the water from the mine, and a splendid bath, it is certain, will be obtainable when the baths are built. The Cumberland mine not being as deep as the Cosmopolitan, the pumps on the latter keep both mines dry. The difference in depth is about 200ft. A large number of prospecting leases are being worked by miners in close proximity to the town, 60 being an average number, and it is noteworthy that during the past 12 months the value of gold per man was £100. A good trade is likely to spring up between Kookynie and the new find at Edjudina, which is about 60 miles dis-tant and is roached by coach. In the opposite direction, the Sons of Gwalia, mine is connected by road with Kookynie.

As a centre, Kookynie promises to become as important as Menzies. The new Roman Catholic Church is a credit to the town, being built of iron, lined and nicely designed. The Salvation Army has a commodious barracks, while the other denominations are also represented. There are many hotels, several of which are well built and ably conducted houses, while the business places are very fair, and all seem to be doing a thriving trade. Mr. T. Campbell, who was Mayor of Menzies at one time, is the chief magistrate of Kookynie. He is a live citizen and runs the leading hotel. Cobb and Co.'s coaches to Edjudina start from his house. Altogether, Kookynie seems to have a great future before it. The mines employ a large number of men, and the district is daily.



To our families, staff, students and community — thank you for sticking with us. You've shown grit, patience and heart in a tough year.






Be yourself. Especially do not feign affection. Neither be cynical about love; for in the face of all aridity and disenchantment, it is as perennial as the grass.
