





What's Up in the Night Sky?

Watch the Red Star Disappear Behind the Moon!



Set your alarms for a lunar occultation from 2am, 15th January.

If you want to see something a bit strange happening in the night sky, this lunar occultation will have you mesmerised.

Antares is a super giant red star and the 15th brightest star we see in the Southern Hemisphere's night sky. In the early hours of 15th January, the Moon will pass in front of Antares and the view should be spectacular.

When the Moon appears to move in front of another object in space like a star or a planet, this is called a lunar occultation and they can be exciting to watch. It's easier to see a lunar occultation when the Moon is near its new phase and there is hardly any illuminated surface. It means the Moon isn't so bright which makes it easier to see the object that's disappearing behind it. Likewise, a lunar occultation is more spectacular if the Moon is passing in front of a brighter star or planet. You will get the full effect! For a better view try looking through binoculars.

When and where to look:

2am to 3.10am, 15th January above the south eastern horizon. These times are suitable for Perth, the Goldfields, Wheatbelt and Mid West. Timing is a little different in the Gascoyne. The occultation will have already commenced prior to Moon rise but stargazers will be able to see Antares reappear just before 3am.



OPENING CELEBRATION.

There was a large gathering at the new Government school house yesterday to celebrate the completion of the build and its being opened for school purposes. Among those present were the Mayor (Mr S. B. Schlam), Warden Owen, Mrs Owen, Miss Hastings, Mr H. Thomas (head master of the school), Mrs Carden, Mrs Lyons, Mrs Bissett, Mr A. Brown, Rev. J. B. Meredith Chaplin, Cr McMeikan, and many others.

The Mayor in formally declaring the school open, referred to the great struggles which the public had made to get the school erected. At first they were offered an iron building, which they were not inclined to accept, and eventually they had obtained very much better accommodation than was at first offered. The place that had been built would, he thought, answer all requirements. He had much pleasure in declaring the school open,

and in doing so referred to the fact that it would be almost the last official act he would perform as Mayor.

Cheers were then given for the Mayor, the Warden, the Education Department, Mr Thomas, the head master, and his two assistants, Miss D. O'Meagher, and Miss Jowett.

Under the direction of Mr Thomas, the school children sang several choruses, and gave some entertaining displays of their proficiency in mental arithmetic.

The visitors then distributed among the large number of children present, biscuits and lollies, which had been generously donated by Messrs J. Wohlherr, Walsh and Son, West and Harris, and Kennedy Bros. A great deal of amusement was caused by scrambles among the children for lollies, and when that was over, the company dispersed.

My Sentimental Journey, M. M. Moore (Lena) nee Green

Former resident Betty Hindle has fond memories of her time in Menzies, she remembers our local resident Janet Henderson and her siblings who attended the Menzies school, where Betty's husband taught.

Through correspondence she has sent us a letter that was in her care. It recounts the journey of an elderly lady returning to the town she grew up in and the memories of her childhood in Menzies in the early part of the last century when the town was as she remembered it a booming mining centre. This is the first instalment of that letter.

Wednesday 27th Aug. 1969. My granddaughter Carolyn Moore (16 yrs 9 mths) & I left Perth on the Kalgoorlie Express at 5:55 PM, arriving Kalgoorlie 7 AM next morning. 2½ hrs later, 9:30 AM, we left on the Mulga train, its destination being Leonora, which it would reach at 6 PM. We were going to Menzies, where my 2 sisters, brother & myself were born (between 1900 & 1908), me the 2nd eldest. Train arrived Menzies 11:10 AM. The weather perfect. Mr. George Templeman, my late sister-in-law's brother, had booked us in at the Railway Hotel (the only one left of 13) that were there in the old days, it being of brick construction & 2 storey.

George Templeman had intended meeting & looking after us (his own words in a letter to my sister) for we could only be there 24 hours as the

train goes up from Kalgoorlie on Thursdays then Leonora to Kalgoorlie Friday of each week. Unfortunately, he had taken ill early in the week and was in Kalgoorlie hospital, but had made arrangements with his sons Gary & John (the latter home for August holidays from Carnarvon where he is a schoolteacher) to meet us and drive us round.

I was struggling to control my emotions (Carolyn having given me a lecture as we were nearing Menzies). I was 11½ yrs old (1916) when we left that once great booming gold mining town of Menzies (also sandalwood cutting for export). Now 53 yrs later (I am 65) I was returning on a sentimental journey to a ghost town. My memory has always been good for most of my 11½ yrs there & felt I could have walked blindfolded from the Railway Station to the Hotel which my father, John Frederick Green, was proprietor for 2½ yrs. I was about 8½ then, & early 1915 moved into the Exchange Hotel the remains of the same now housing the engine for the town lighting and goes "clink clink" all day until midnight when it "lights out" & hurricane lamps take over, at least at the Hotel, one being placed outside each bedroom door.

6th January 1916 we left Menzies for Fremantle, the Menzies hotels had gradually dwindled over the years to 8 and then 3, hoteliers had "bought out" 5 and we were one of the 5.

THE 'OCEANIC,' FREMANTLE.

Mr. Jack Green, lately of the Exchange Hotel, Menzies, has taken over from Mr. Visser the well-known Oceanic Hotel, Fremantle. Mr. Green was for nearly 20 years one of the leading hotelkeepers at Menzies, and he left the goldfields town carrying the goodwill of everybody who knew him. Among the workers of the Port host Green should cultivate an extensive clientele, and follow in the footsteps of his predecessor.

- By preventing loss of water and body fluids, skin helps control your body temperature.
- Skin allows you to feel things, such as heat, cold, touch, pain, and vibration.

Skin absorbs ultraviolet light from the sun, which you need to make vitamin D. Vitamin D is important for good bone health. Most Australians can get enough vitamin D through safe exposure to the sun.

Skin conditions affect people differently. Some common skin conditions include:

- acne
- cellulitis
- eczema or dermatitis
- psoriasis
- rosacea
- hives (urticaria)
- Warts

Skin conditions can be caused by:

- allergies or irritants
- insect bites
- bacterial, fungal or viral infections
- stress
- hormonal imbalance
- a build-up of sweat or oil on the skin

Skin conditions can also occur due to problems with the immune system. Smoking, drinking alcohol, and some medicines may worsen your skin condition.

Exposure to ultraviolet (UV) radiation from the sun is the most common cause of skin cancer. Skin cancers are the most common types of cancer in Australia. If you need to go out in the sun, it's important to protect your skin if the UV index is 3 or above.

Here are some tips to help protect your skin from UV damage:

Slip on sun-protective clothing that covers as much skin as possible.

Slop on sun protection factor (SPF) 30+ sunscreen before going outside and reapply every 2 hours.

Slap on a hat that protects your face, head, neck and ears.

Seek shade to stay out of direct sunlight.

Slide on sunglasses when you're outdoors to protect your eyes from the sun.

DOGS AT LARGE IN MENZIES

Dogs have been observed at large in Menzies and not under proper control. A dog that is not under proper control is liable to be seized by an authorised person such as a ranger or other person authorised by the CEO. If the authorised person is unable to identify the owner of the dog, that dog is liable to be seized, impounded and may be destroyed.

Any dog that is in a public place must be securely tethered or otherwise controlled.

If a dog isn't controlled, the Dog Act provides for a fine of up to \$5,000.00. The Council's Ranger has been advised of the situation in Menzies and is being vigilant relating to dog offences.

If a dog is impounded, the costs to retrieve that dog are substantial.

If you see a dog roaming unattended, please report it by completing the form - visit

www.menzies.wa.gov.au/council/shire-services - Animal Services, copies are available from the CRC and Admin.

Have any of thought about the future of Menzies? Particularly for when the gold runs out? Gold being a finite thing, it will run out sooner or later.

For some years now, I've had the notion that it might be a good idea to found a university in or around Menzies. There are a number of reasons why I thought a university here might be a good thing, other than for when the gold runs out.

Firstly, this area would make a great base from which to study the ecosystems in a semi-arid region such as ours. Mining research and development would be another viable course of study, seeing as there is more to mine than gold. These, along with other studies, of course.

Secondly, the presence of a university would give Menzies some measure of population stability, making other long term projects more viable. A more stable population would also provide more employment opportunities.



I would very much like to hear what others think of this idea, or perhaps even some alternative ideas for the long term future of Menzies.
