Acting CEO's Message

Outback Grave Markers –

The Shire of Menzies is pleased to welcome back to Menzies Trevor Tough and his team from Out-

back Grave Markers. They are expected to arrive around the last week of May.

Outback Grave Markers, a team of volunteers supported by councils such as Menzies, travel all over the state preserving our history by researching the names and locations of those who have died and placing markers at our various cemeteries. Any visitor to the Menzies Cemetery can't help but notice the long line of markers recording those who lived and died and whose memorials are largely lost to the elements.

If you see the team working, make sure you say hello and maybe have a chat.

Disputed Election – Local Government elections in Menzies are run by the Electoral Commission. At the last election, held in October last year, a complaint was lodged that the polling place at Tjuntjuntjara closed early and therefore prevented some from voting. This matter is presently before the Courts, and the case is yet to be settled. The next hearing will be in late June, when the lawyers for the complainant and the Electoral Commission will continue with their arguments. The result of the case has critical implications for councillor representation, as the results from the October election were very close. If it is determined that the polling place did close early, the declared election results could change.

Review of Council Plan – The Council Plan is a statutory document that takes in a ten-year time span. However, every two years it is given a ‘desktop’ review to ensure that it is on course. This review isn’t a public process and will be undertaken internally with the assistance of an external consultant.

Grading and Road Maintenance – Roads are the links that enable motorists, heavy haulage and visitors to go about their business or simply see our wonderful shire. Therefore, the maintenance of those roads is vital, but not without its challenges. Most of our roads are unsealed and were not originally designed for the size and weight of present traffic, especially mining traffic.

Recently, heavy haulage vehicles did great damage to roads around Kookynie, resulting in some road closures. As no permission for this haulage had been given, investigations began and it was discovered that permission had been sought, but only from the Shire of Leonora. The contractors didn’t know that they were driving on roads under the care and control of the Shire of Menzies. We are arranging discussions with not only the haulage contractor but also Main Roads WA, as these ‘mistakes’ are both costly and inconvenient.

On a more positive note, road maintenance contractors have re-commenced their critical contracts and residents should see the work happening. We have also contacted the Tjuntjuntjara community advising that Aboriginal access roads will be receiving essential grading maintenance to ensure that

those residents can safely access Kalgoorlie and points further afield.

Roaming Dogs – Although a roaming dog that attacked and injured a young man on a scooter has been euthanised, dog owners are still allowing their dogs to roam. Ranger services don’t follow set times for their visits to Menzies and have been instructed to impound dogs that are roaming. Fines are heavy.

Wandering Cattle – Progress has been made with relations to wandering cattle.

The Shire of Leonora has kindly loaned us their portable stock yards. These yards are presently set up just outside of Menzies and provided with a water source. Cattle are now getting used to this water source. One-way gates will be fitted soon, and the cattle will then be effectively trapped. As there is little point in transporting the cattle into the bush, as they will either wander back into town or continue to be a traffic hazard, they will likely be put down on the order of a justice if the owner cannot be readily identified and other means of disposal would be too expensive.

Once we have proven this concept, we can relocate the cattle yards to other places such as Kookynie and repeat the process.

The Dance of the Planets

From mid May and into the month of June, stargazers are in for stunning evening night sky views! It's the best stargazing all year! The planets of Venus, Jupiter and Mercury will put on a show that will change every night. You'll be able to watch from evening to evening and see the motion of our Solar System in action.

The 19th May is a delight with bright Venus appearing alongside a wonderful crescent Moon. Jupiter is higher above. But Mercury is nowhere to be seen....yet! As the evenings progress, Venus will appear to get closer to Jupiter, making its closest approach on 10th June. Mercury will appear lower on the horizon in late May, climbing higher in the night sky to join Jupiter in mid to late June. Venus will appear to overtake Jupiter and climb higher into the night sky.

Enjoy this wonderful spectacle of some of the best naked-eye planets dancing across the evening sky.

When and where to look:

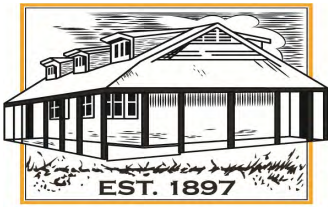
Start watching after sunset from 6.00pm, 19th May.

MENZIES BREWERY COMPANY LTD

1896 – 1899

The office of Menzies Brewery Company was in Shenton Street, Menzies. The Brewer, Secretary, Manager and licensee was W.J. Suiter.

In November 1896, the Menzies Brewery had been in full blast for some time. Expansion was proposed and an additional well was to be required. By January 1897 the first dividend of two shillings

per share was paid. Within about a year the office address had changed to Brown Street, Menzies, and the Secretary had become A.E. Roberts.

My Sentimental Journey, M. M. Moore (Lena) nee Green

My Sentimental Journey recounts a 1969 visit by a former resident, Lena, returning to her birthplace after 53 years. In this evocative letter, she shares vivid memories of her childhood during the early 20th century, describing Menzies as she knew it then—a booming mining town. We are pleased to present the final instalment of her journey home.

Eventually, I think it was Carolyn & one of the teachers, Georgia, that got the site of both dump & house spot pinned.

The dump, with time, is almost flat & the house spot nothing but the ground, not even an old pepper tree there. (I remember we never did have one!) as most other houses did & many still stand today marking the spots where the homes of the dear Menzies folk lived. A tough life for all, but mostly “good friends & neighbours.”

I felt my mind somehow got inside the girls’ cameras, everything is so vivid in my memory. We returned to the Hotel & the girls left for Leonora & elsewhere. A little later we had lunch & the Templeman boys came & took us to the station & the old Mulga train to leave for Kalgoorlie at 2 p.m. Gary, the Menzies resident, giving me an old stone ginger beer bottle with the name A. SCOTT, MENZIES & DAYHURST imprinted on it (went to school with Mr. Scott’s daughters Edna & Vera). Also he gave me a glass bottle with a marble in it which in those days was the cork or stopper, the names LOCK & MEAGHER, MENZIES imprinted on it. Also at the station Gary put into my hand a tiny piece of quartz with a little gold in it. He told me an Aborigine had found it on Friday Hill & given it to him.

It was a nostalgic farewell for me as the old train groaned out of Menzies station, one engine pulling, one pushing at the rear. Max. speed 35 miles per hr. for the 51 miles to Kalgoorlie, transferring to the Kalgoorlie Express leaving 7 p.m. & arrived Perth Station 9.30 a.m. Saturday 30th August.

The 2 Templeman young men & those dear lady school teachers having made the 24 hours in the town of my birth an unforgettable memory. I felt an antique & they treated me as if I were an heirloom, & worthy perhaps all round.

In my opinion, it was an education and experience for her. I am sure she will have happy memories, but of course, she told me it was the Kalgoorlie Express — both ways — that left the biggest thrill of the trip for her. But I think, in due course of time, she will be pleased to have the bottles and the tiny stone with the little gold in it as keepsakes from her NAN.



Influenza vaccines change from year to year as new strains of influenza virus appear. This is one reason vaccination against influenza is given every year.

For the 2026 influenza season, the following influenza vaccines, will be available for use in Australia for the age groups listed against each product.

FluMist 2 years to less than 12 years

Vaxigrip 6 months and over

Fluelvax 6 months and over

Fluad 50 years and over

All vaccines in the table above will be available free of charge.

FluMist, nasal spray (needle-free) presentation, is also available for children aged between 2 years and less than 12 years.

For people aged under 65 years, two free vaccines are available: Fluelvax, and Vaxigrip. Fluelvax and Vaxigrip are being supplied in 2026 for people aged under 65 years who are in the following at risk groups:

- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people
- Pregnant women
- People who have certain medical conditions.

All people aged 65 years and over are eligible for free influenza vaccines.

- Influenza is a respiratory illness caused by the influenza virus and is a common cause of hospitalisation and death, particularly in people at greater risk of severe disease.

Annual influenza vaccination is recommended for **all people aged 6 months and over** and is available free under the National Immunisation Program for eligible groups at the highest

risk of influenza and its complications.

- Influenza vaccines currently available in Australia include injectable (non-live) and intranasal (live attenuated) vaccines. Both vaccine types are equally effective and safe when used in the appropriate age groups and in people with suitable health status.

- The intranasal will be available in Australia from 2026. It has been used safely and effectively in millions of children across the UK, USA and Canada.

- Influenza is seasonal, and vaccines are updated to cover changes in circulating strains each influenza season. Yearly vaccination is required for continuing immunity.

Influenza vaccine can be co-administered with (i.e. given on the same day as) most other vaccines. Consider updating your COVID vaccination.

An influenza vaccine is recommended before the start of the influenza season – which is typically around May in Australia. Optimal protection lasts for 3–4 months following vaccination.

Immunisation providers should start administering influenza vaccinations as soon as the vaccine is available.

The timing of peak influenza activity in Australia can vary each year. It typically occurs between May and September, but infections can occur year-round; the vaccines are therefore also available outside of the influenza season. It is never too late in the influenza season to get an influenza vaccine.

Free Flu Vaccines will be available at the Menzies Nursing Post in May.

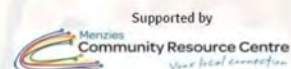

Letter to the Editor

I learnt many years ago that good communication is vital for being well organised, particularly with regards to when people have to work together. Clear communication then becomes exceedingly important and useful in promoting efficiency and productivity. I remember when I worked for International Computers Limited (ICL), which no longer exists, they ran a communications course (outsourced). Interpersonal communications that is. people talking face to face or in a group such as a toolbox meeting. The course focused on such items as avoiding ambiguity, not hogging a conversation, avoiding mumbling, and such, as well as a little about body language.

I think it would be a great thing for council to consider running, being the biggest employer in town. Not only for council staff but also for other

interested members of the community and perhaps even other business staff, seeing as other members of the community engage with council staff frequently.

When the course was run by ICL back in the mid 80s, it was run such that there were only small groups of about 5 or 6 people at a time, with the course running for some 2 or 3 days per group, but only half day each day so that staff could still get actual work done. This meant that 2 groups could take the course each day.

As I said, this was in the mid 80s. And 40 years later this course continues to serve me very well. It is for this reason that I would highly recommend it.
