All items must conform to the following:

- Items must be neatly stacked on the verge
- Any white goods are acceptable
- No putrescible rubbish of any type

All items must be on the verge, Shire staff will not enter any property to collect rubbish of any nature. Car bodies will be subject to arrangements with the Manager Works and Services.

This is the chance to have a thorough clean up prior to the fire season, please take this opportunity to get rid of that unwanted rubbish.

PRODUCT RECALL—APPLE IPHONE 5 BATTERY REPLACEMENT PROGRAM



Apple has determined that a very small percentage of iPhone 5 devices may suddenly experience shorter battery life or need to be charged more frequently.

The affected iPhone 5 devices were sold between September 2012 and January 2013 and fall within a limited serial number range.

If your iPhone 5 is experiencing these symptoms and meets the eligibility requirements noted below, Apple will replace your iPhone 5 battery, free of charge.

Eligibility

If your iPhone is in working order and exhibits the symptoms noted above, use the serial number checker at <https://ssl.apple.com/support/iphone5-battery/> to see if it is eligible for this program.

Replacement process

Choose one of the service options below to have your battery replaced. Your iPhone will be examined prior to any service to verify that it is eligible for this program and in working order.

Please call your service provider to confirm that battery replacement service is available on the day you visit them.

To prepare your iPhone 5 for the battery replacement process, please follow the steps below:

- Back up your data to iTunes or iCloud
- Turn off Find my iPhone
- Erase data and settings in Settings > General > Reset > Erase all Content and Settings

Note: If your iPhone 5 has any damage such as a cracked screen which impairs the replacement of the battery, that issue will need to be resolved prior to the battery replacement. In some cases, there may be a cost associated with the repair.

Additional Information

Apple may restrict or limit repair to the original country of purchase.

If you believe your iPhone 5 was affected by this issue, and you paid to replace your battery, you can contact Apple about a refund.

This worldwide Apple program doesn't extend the standard warranty coverage of the iPhone 5. The program covers affected iPhone 5 batteries for two years after the first retail sale of the unit or until March 1, 2015, whichever provides longer coverage.

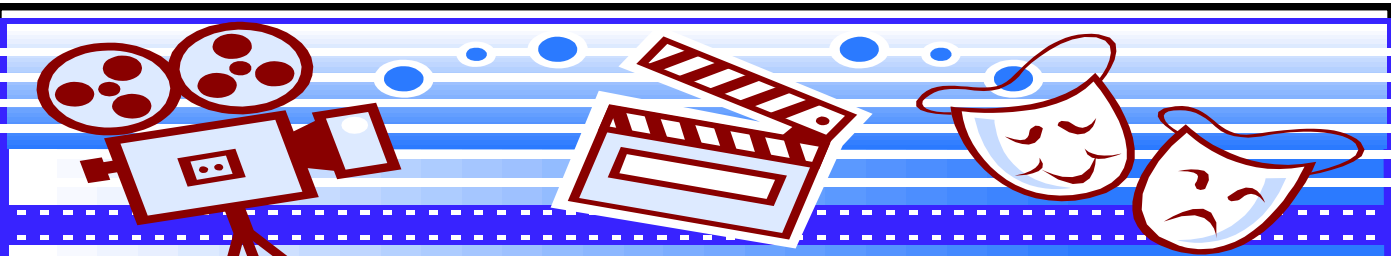

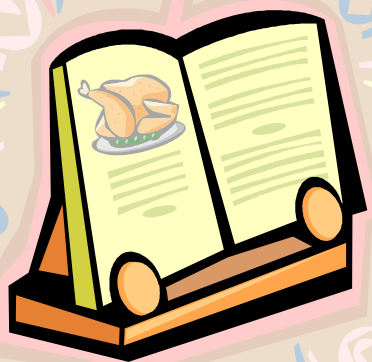

Recipes

GREEK STYLE LAMB SALAD

220g lamb steaks
1 tbsp olive oil
Salt and ground black pepper, to taste

Greek-Style Salad

6 handfuls spinach or rocket leaves
2 spring onions, finely chopped
300g cherry tomatoes, halved
2 Lebanese cucumbers, sliced
400g green beans, lightly cooked, drained and refreshed
2 tablespoons capers
Finely grated zest and juice of 1 lemon
60g feta or goat cheese, crumbled
4 tablespoons pesto thinned with 2 tablespoons boutique extra virgin olive oil, to dress



Step 1

Rub lamb with oil and season with salt and pepper. Heat a heavy frypan over medium-high heat and sear lamb for 4 minutes each side. For medium-rare it should feel soft when you press the centre.

Step 2

Remove from pan, cover with tin foil and a clean tea towel and allow to rest.

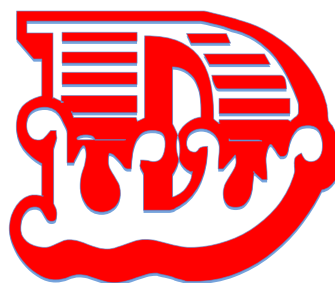
Step 3

While lamb rests, make Greek-Style Salad by placing spinach or rocket, spring onions, tomatoes, cucumbers, beans and capers in a salad bowl.

Step 4

Slice lamb thinly across the grain and add to salad along with meat juices from the board and lemon zest and juice. Toss to combine then sprinkle with feta or goat cheese and drizzle with thinned pesto to serve.

DUNCAN WELCOMES TOUGH APPROACH TO HOONS

27 AUGUST 2014

The Liberal-National Government continues to tackle the scourge of hoon driving with 1038 vehicles seized by WA police so far this year.

Kalgoorlie MLA, Wendy Duncan said that the hoon legislation empowers police to impound vehicles that are driven in a reckless manner, do a burnout or are driven at a speed equal to or greater than 45kms over the posted speed limit. A third conviction under the laws sees your vehicle confiscated; sending a strong message to the community that hoon driving will not be tolerated.

"When the Minister for Police Liza Harvey and Commissioner Karl O'Callaghan attended a forum in Boulder recently, the issue of hooning and vehicle noise was raised by several of the people who attended," Ms Duncan said. "It is great to see that the police are responding to these complaints in Kalgoorlie-Boulder with extra speed cameras and patrolling of residential streets."

With the hoon legislation firmly in place, the WA courts are starting to see drivers appearing on a first or second offence but not coming back on a third as the reality that their car will permanently be taken from them takes effect.

People who do not own the car and undertake hoon activity are not exempt under the laws as the driver of the impounded vehicle is responsible for paying all towage and storage costs if convicted. The owner of the vehicle is notified by police.

"The value of the car is not important under the legislation; it is the message that if you repeatedly hoon, putting your life and the lives of others in danger, then you will lose your car," Ms Duncan added.

Ms Duncan said that her electorate office has had many complaints about noise and safety issues associated with hooning in Kalgoorlie-Boulder and she would continue to bring hotspots to the attention of police.

Money from the auctioning of vehicles permanently confiscated automatically goes into the Road Trauma Trust Account which is used to improve regional run off roads, intersections and road safety education campaigns.

Community members can report a hoon through an online traffic complaint report available on the WA Police website or by calling 131 444 for immediate police attendance.

WESTERN AUSTRALIAN LITTER PENALTIES



LITTERING IS ILLEGAL

Under Western Australia's *Litter Act 1979*, littering is illegal. The Act authorises Keep Australia Beautiful Council (as part of the WA Department of Environment and Conservation), local government, police and other litter enforcement agencies to take action against those who litter. This action can be in the form of 'on-the-spot fines', or as reports to the Keep Australia Beautiful Council which are followed up by infringement notices being sent to the offenders.

Not paying your fine can lead to court action or result in your fine being sent to the Fines Enforcement Registry which has the power to withdraw licences until the fine is paid.

NEW PENALTIES FOR LITTERING

In August 2012 the Western Australian Parliament passed amendments to the *Litter Act 1979* which resulted in an increase in littering penalties and a greater range of littering offences.

How will these changes affect the public?

Littering fines will now cost more.

- Cigarette butt littering fines have increased from \$75 to \$200 for individuals and \$500 for corporations (businesses).
- Corporations can now be fined \$500 for littering offences by their workers.
- Fines for some offences have increased to \$500 for individuals and \$2 000 for corporations.
- If taken to court, maximum penalties for littering offences have increased to \$5 000 for individuals and \$10 000 for corporations, or in the case of offences against the litter regulations (in the table below), \$5 000 for both individuals and corporations.



Vehicle owners will now have to take responsibility for any littering from their car or boat.

In cases of littering from vehicles, where neither the litterer nor the driver of the vehicle can be identified, the person responsible for the vehicle (usually the registered owner) will be deemed to have committed the offence and will have to pay the fine unless they can identify the offender.

There is a greater emphasis on littering that is hazardous to the community.

A new littering category called "Littering that creates a public risk" will attract an infringement penalty of \$500 for individuals and \$2 000 for corporations. Examples include (but is not limited to) the littering of car bodies and car parts, batteries, hazardous chemicals or medicines, fridges and freezers with doors attached, tyres, lit cigarettes and syringes. (Details in table below).

What else do I need to know?

In Western Australia littering infringements can be issued by authorised officers that include: police officers, local government rangers and other officers employed by government departments that oversee the protection of the environment and waterways.

The Keep Australia Beautiful Council, through the Litter Report Scheme, issues infringements in response to litter reports from community members who are registered litter reporters.

Menzies to Nicoli

REMARKABLE PERFORMANCE BY WEARY

Breaking clear of the field before Bardoc (more than 40 miles from home), the Collie rider, Alf Nicoli, was never again headed and he came across the finishing line about half a mile clear of the local riders F. Tedge, who secured second placing and time honours for the race, G. Saunders and V. Robinson, in the annual Chas. Egan Memorial road race run over the 81 mile Menzies-Kalgoorlie course by the Eastern Goldfields Cycle Club yesterday.

The road was easily the worst that riders have had to contend with in post-war years and, of the 50 who faced the starter at Menzies, only 20 finished, punctures and falls taking a relentless toll of the riders.

Nicoli who finished full of running and as "fresh as paint," said after the race that he had "had the worst moment of his life" when he punctured about two miles on the Kalgoorlie side of Broad Arrow. He quickly whipped off the damaged single however and substituting a new one he renewed his gruelling ride to Kalgoorlie with a long lead and the rich prize in his grasp.

The local rider and favourite for the race, Cyril Weary, registered a remarkable performance – possibly the most remarkable in the long history of the race – by riding the last 70 miles of the course with only one handlebar and carrying the broken one, to which was attached the front brake lever, and registering the good riding time of 4 hours 10 minutes, only 13½ minutes outside the time registered by Tedge in securing time honours.

The record crowd which crowded Hannan Street on both sides of the finishing line, and which refused to move back

off the road despite repeated exhortations over the loudspeakers by club officials, caused a serious fall as Tedge, Saunders and Robinson raced neck and neck to the line for second placing. The three riders were almost in line about 50 yards from the finish when the crowd pressed in on the riders causing them to collide and Robinson in turn to fall. Robinson quickly scrambled to his feet and crossed the line to take fourth money. In recognition of his plucky ride, and as compensation for his wretched luck, four local sportsmen each subscribed a guinea and donated the £4 4/ to Robinson.

There was another fall as four riders raced to the line for 12th place. This time it was caused when the Victorian A. Hart's single came off and he fell. In turn L. Eiffler fell over Hart and E. Green who was following the pair, switched around them to win the sprint, with Eiffler skidding over the line a "photo finish" winner over Hart for 13th placing.

The weather was cool and bright, with a side wind, when the limit man, J. Sheridan, with half an hour's start, was sent off from Menzies at 10 a.m.

With the big field well on its way, Cyril Weary showed early that he was going to make it hard for his co-back men when he broke away with a 100 yards' lead over them in the first half mile. Hart dropped back from the three-minute bunch when he punctured after about two miles – the first victim claimed by the road – and Les Burford, O. Collins and E. Currie had all punctured before four miles had been traversed, while W. Strauch had retired from the race with machine trouble.

At Comet Vale D. Hayes and K. Lawrence were together, about three minutes ahead of C. Norris, Stuart, Sheridan and Sievwright, L. Rymer had teamed up with a strong bunch, comprising L. Mead, A. Nicoli, R. Kenworthy, R. Cleary and E. Beetson, and was working his way towards the leaders, while at the rear of the field Cyril Weary, with his handle bars

broken, led the scratch men in pursuit of G. Saunders and F. Tedge, who were quickly bridging the gap to the leaders and threading their way through the big field. The South Australian, Dean Whitehorn, fell before reaching Comet Vale and also punctured at that point.

At Goongarrie Lawrence and Hayes still led from Norris and Stuart, with Blacklock and Sheridan next, and then a big bunch, in which Rymer, Nicoli and Mead were prominent. Another strong bunch, which had formed at the rear of the field, comprised Saunders, Tedge, Rowatt, Robinson and Creagh, and this quintette was pedalling strongly ahead of Steele and A. W. Smith, with Cyril Weary and Skews not far behind.

Lawrence punctured near Canegrass and this left Norris and Hayes in front, with Nicoli breaking away from his bunch and going in pursuit of the leaders, and Rymer also making a forward move. Tedge and Saunders, with Robinson, were making their presence felt at that stage and were quickly passing rider after rider in their advance towards the head of the field.

Bardoc saw Nicoli in the van. He was well clear and, with a brilliant burst of pedalling, he raced on to the bitumen at Broad Arrow, four minutes ahead of Rymer, who was making a gallant but unavailing attempt to bridge the gap, and a further minutes and a half to Tedge, Saunders and Robinson, the only others with a show. Hayes followed after an interval,

with Cyril Weary and Hyde next.

Disaster threatened the leader as he punctured two miles outside Broad Arrow, but he managed to change his single before too much of his valuable lead had dwindled, and he set off again along the narrow bitumen strip with a winning lead. Saunders, Tedge and Robinson collared Rymer, dropped him almost as quickly, and set off in pursuit of Nicoli, but the Collie rider made good use of his lead and stalled them off all the way over the final gruelling 15 miles, and crossed the finishing line with about half a mile to spare.
