Matters arising from the Ordinary Meeting of Council held Thursday 26th March 2009.

1. Caravan Park Upgrade

The Caravan Park upgrade is progressing splendidly and the contracts for the engineering, fencing, and ablutions have already been issued and this project should appreciably be concluded by Mid May 2009. In the interim a temporary facility established at the Town Oval is very suitable and the tenants are quite happy with these temporary facilities.

2. Lady Shenton Resource Centre Upgrade.

Similarly, the contract for the supply and installation of ablutions for the Lady Shenton has also been issued and this should be concluded and functional by Mid June 2009.

3. Menzies Air-Field Re-alignment Project.

Council has progressed this project with a resolution to re-align the field and has applied for funding from the Commonwealth Government under the "Remote Aerodrome Safety Programme", where council plans to seal the strip, fence, light and provide basic infrastructure to the location.

4. Ward Boundary and Representational Review

On a more administrative matter, Council resolved to proceed with the Ward and Representational Review as advertised with the results of the review being a recommendation to the Advisory Board that the Menzies Ward amalgamate with the Kookynie town site to be renamed the "Town Ward" with four elected members, and with the remainder of the Shire being merged as one ward named the "Rural Ward, with three elected members. Accordingly it remains up to the Advisory board to determined the effective result of that review and Council should hear shortly in this regard.

5. Tjuma Pulka Radio Station

Council supported the application for 50% funding in the 2009/10 year to assist the the Tjuma Pulka radio station to rebroadcast the radio to the residents of Menzies . This is a great direction for council and is planned for inclusion in the 2009/10 budget year. Accordingly we await the budget adoption before proceeding with this exciting project.

THE BIBLE SHOULD BE TAUGHT IN SCHOOLS

That teachers would be instructed to be guided within a code of conduct not to misrepresent the Bible to students, by combining quotes with truisms to be followed For example." And Judas took a rope and hung himself," should not be in the same lesson as "go forth therefore and do likewise."

So having dealt with the case against the introduction of the Bible in a sensible way the case for its introduction is still so strong that the Bible should introduced into the school curriculum.

Theresa's family left the mission regularly on lengthy bush trips where they revisited country and fulfilled ceremonial responsibilities during the mission years where Theresa gained much knowledge about the country and Tjukurpa. In this painting Theresa shows the women at Upurl Upurlila Nguratja, the rockhole at Cundeelee and home of the Tadpoletjukurpa (story). It also shows the women with their digging sticks and dishes as they have been cleaning the rockhole. The background colours represent the red sand and the green trees.



EASTER - Hot cross buns

Serving Size: 16
Category: Cakes and
Baking, Lunch box & Snacks



Ingredients:

- I tablespoon dried yeast
- ½ cup caster sugar
- I cup (250mL) warm milk
- 4 cups plain flour (bread flour)
- I teaspoon cinnamon
- I teaspoon all spice
- 60g butter, chopped
- ½ cup currants
- ½ cup sultanas
- ½ cup (125mL) warm water
- I egg, lightly beaten
- I tablespoon apricot jam

Flour paste

- ½ cup plain flour
- I tablespoon caster sugar
- I/3 cup (80mL) water

Method: Place yeast, sugar and milk in a small bowl, whisk until yeast dissolves. Cover with plastic wrap, stand in a warm place (see Notes) for 10 minutes or until mixture is frothy. Sift flour, cinnamon and all spice into a large bowl and rub in butter (try the Buddhism for Mothers approach and embrace the moment). Stir in yeast mixture, currants, sultanas, egg and water. Cover with plastic wrap and stand in a warm place (see Notes) for 1 hour or until mixture has doubled in size.

Grease a deep 23cm square tin with butter. Turn dough onto a floured surface (let the kids help you punch the air out) and knead for 5 minutes. Divide dough into 16 pieces, form into balls and place in the tin. Stand in warm place (see Notes) for 20 minutes or until dough has doubled in size.

Preheat oven to 180°C. To prepare flour paste, combine flour and sugar in a bowl; gradually blend in enough water to form a thickish smooth paste. Spoon paste into a piping bag with a small plain tube or use a snap lock bag and cut off a tiny corner. Pipe crosses onto buns—four long lines vertically and then horizontally across each row of buns.

Bake for 10 minutes then reduce heat to 160°C for about 20 minutes. Turn onto a wire rack and brush with warm jam (or not if you don't like sticky buns).

- This recipe involves Ih 20 min standing (rising) time for the dough.
- Nothing like working with yeast and kneading to bring out your inner Domestic Goddess!
- If your house is a bit on the cool side when you are baking buns, you will find warm places are in the laundry if the dryer is on, on top of the oven if you are baking something else or sit the bowl/tin on a heated wheat bag.
- Will keep in an airtight container for a few days; reheat in the oven for 5-10 minutes before serving.

ANZAC biscuits

Method:

Turn oven to 160'C. Lightly grease oven trays.

Put oats, flour, coconut, sugar in big mixing bowl. Melt butter and golden syrup in pan. Take off heat.

Mix baking soda and boiling water in a cup. Add to melted butter in the pan. Quickly add to big mixing bowl. Mix well.

Roll tablespoonful lots into balls. put on trays 5cm apart. Press lightly with fork. Bake for 20 minutes, one tray at a time. Allow to cool on tray for a crisp biscuit.

ANZAC DAY - 25TH APRIL 2009

On 25 April every year, Australians commemorate ANZAC Day. It commemorates the landing of Australian and New Zealand troops at Gallipoli on 25 April 1915. The date, 25 April, was officially named ANZAC Day in 1916. ANZAC stands for Australian and New Zealand Army Corps. In 1917, the word ANZAC meant someone who fought at Gallipoli and later it came to mean any Australian or New Zealander who fought or served in the First World War. During the Second World War, ANZAC Day became a day on which the lives of all Australians lost in war time were remembered. The spirit of ANZAC recognises the qualities of courage, mateship and sacrifice which were demonstrated at the Gallipoli landing.

Commemorative services are held at dawn on 25 April, the time of the original landing, across the nation, usually at war memorials. This was initiated by returned soldiers after the First World War in the 1920s as a common form of remembrance. The first official dawn service was held at the Sydney Cenotaph in 1927, which was also the first year that all states recognised a public holiday on the day. Initially dawn services were only attended by veterans who followed the ritual of 'standing to' before two minutes of silence was observed, broken by the sound of a lone piper playing the 'Last Post'. Later in the day, there were marches in all the major cities and many smaller towns for families and other well wishers.

Poets Corner ~ We'll All Be Rooned, Said Hanrahan

Taken from an Anthology called "Around The Boree Log", by John O'Brien, which was first published in 1921. "John O'Brien" was the pen-name of Patrick Joseph Hartigan (1879-1952). He published only one book of verse, Around The Boree Log, written while he was parish priest of Narrandera, New South Wales.

Thus it is, that about one hundred years ago, somewhere in outback Australia,

"We'll all be rooned," said Hanrahan, In accents most forlorn, Outside the church, ere Mass began, One frosty Sunday morn.

The congregation stood about,

Coat collars to the ears,

And talked of stock, and crops, and

drought,

As it had done for years.

"It's lookin' crook," said Daniel Croke,
"Bedad, it's cruke, me lad,
For never since the banks went broke
Has seasons been so bad."

"It's dry, all right," said young O'Neil,
With which astute remark
He squatted down upon his heel
And chewed a piece of bark.

And so around the chorus ran
"It's keeping' dry, no doubt."
"We'll all be rooned," said Hanrahan
Before the year is out.

"The crops are done; ye'll have your work

To save one bag of grain;
From here way out to Back-o'-Bourke
They're singing out for rain.

"They're singing out for rain," he said,

"And all the tanks are dry."

The congregation scratched its head,

And gazed around the sky.

"There wont be grass, in any case,

Enough to feed an ass;
There's not a blade on Casey's place
As I came down to Mass."

"If rain don't come this month," said

Dan.

And cleared his throat to speak-"We'll all be rooned," said Hanrahan,
"If rain don't come this week."

A heavy silence seemed to steal
On all at this remark;
And each man squatted on his heel,
And chewed a piece of bark.

"We want an inch of rain, we do,"
O'Neil observed at last;
But Croke "maintained" we wanted
two
To put the danger past.

"If we don't get three inches, man,
Or four to break this drought,
We'll all be rooned," said Hanrahan,
"Before the year is out."

In God's good time down came the rain;

And all the afternoon

On iron roof and window-pane

And through the night it pattered still,

And lightsome, glidesome elves

It drummed a homely tune.

On dripping spout and window-sill Kept talking to themselves. It pelted, pelted, all day long,
a-singing at it's work,
Till every heart took up the song
Way out to Back-o'-Bourke.

And every creek a banker ran,
And dams filled overtop;
"We'll all be rooned," said Hanrahan,
"If this rain doesn't stop."

And stop it did, in god's good time;
And spring came in to fold
A mantle o'er the hills sublime
Of green and pink and gold.

And days went by on dancing feet;
With harvest-hopes immense,
And happy eyes beheld the wheat
Nid-nodding o'er the fence.

And, oh, the smiles on every face;
As happy lad and lass
Through grass knee-deep, on Casey's
place
Went riding down to Mass.

While round the church in clothes genteel
Discoursed the men of mark,
And each man squatted on his heel,
And chewed a piece of bark.

"There'll be bush-fires for sure, me man,

# Shock in the mail for Pingelly postie

Postie Greg Carter has never taken his beloved Honda CT110 motorcycle out of rural Pingelly let alone for a jaunt across the Nullarbor and a spin over the Sydney Harbour Bridge.

It therefore came as a shock when a notice arrived in the mail on Tuesday from the Roads and Traffic Authority of NSW claiming Carter's trusty red postie bike had been snapped crossing the Sydney landmark without paying the \$3 road toll.

The notice said the bike had crossed the bridge at 12.09pm on January 25 and an electronic tag had not been detected. The snapped registration number was 1CP 092 —

the same as Carter's set of work wheels – and he was asked to cough up \$3.

The notice left Carter more than a little bemused given his bike had not even been for a day-trip out of Pingelly, about 160km south-east of Perth, in the three years he had been working as a contract postie.

"I certainly wasn't riding my postie bike across Sydney Harbour Bridge that day because I was playing bowls in Pingelly," the 49-year-old laughed.

The NSW Roads Authority said there had been errors reading number plates in a small number of cases and apologised to Carter.
