Goldmines and Memories By Rod Baker

Rod Baker was born in Kalgoorlie, and has always had a fascination with Goldfields History. The Father of three is retired and lives in Perth, however he regularly visits the region to 'do a bit of prospecting and visit some of the old ghost towns in the Northern Goldfields'. Here is his Local History contribution for this month.

Frank Walton- Menzies Pioneers

In 1893 Francis (Frank) WALTON travelled from Hergott Springs (now called Marree) South Australia to Coolgardie with a camel team, a distance of 2400 kilometres. On the 4 October 1894, three days after the first claims for Menzies had been registered as The Lady Shenton and Florence Mines, Frank WALTON set up his hessian bough shed and was selling groceries, mining tools and working clothes.

After a partnership with Bernard SPALHOLTZ was dissolved in 1898, in August of the same year Frank erected a new brick store and residence in Shenton Street. He named the property the PIONEER STORE, not to be confused with the current sign of the Pioneer Store in Shenton street. That particular store was owned and built by James O'DONNELL who were stationers and booksellers. Frank's store was described to be the handsomest building in Menzies and was the result of confidence in the future of the town. Due to the completion of the railway line from Fremantle to Menzies via Kalgoorlie in March, it had made it the head of the line and distribution centre for the Northern Goldfields. That same year nephew Joseph F HARROLD joined Frank to manage his Pioneer Store. Joseph's sister Catherine M HARROLD (spinster) returned from NSW to Menzies to run Joseph's household in Webb Street. Frank became a well respected member of the Menzies community and was renown for backing prospectors and locals when times were tough.

1902 saw Frank seriously beaten by a well known local sportsman who had previously repaid a loan and then reappeared a day later to cash a cheque. Whilst Frank was opening the safe, the man hit Frank over the head with an iron bar. Calls for help brought neighbours to his property whilst the assailant fled the scene. The assailant was found shortly afterward, having committed suicide.

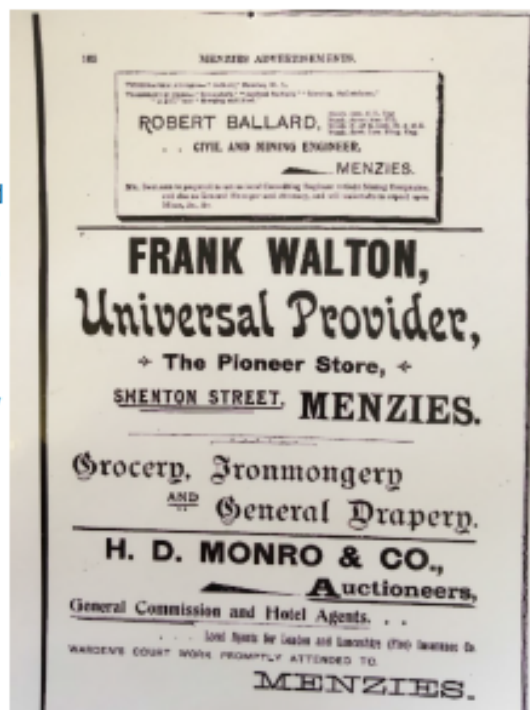
In October 1903, Frank left Menzies on a journey to the Pilbara. He boarded a ship in Fremantle and sailed to Port Hedland, arriving after seven days. Once in Port Hedland he hired a camel team and headed for Marble Bar. Here he sacked his Afghan Cameleer and hired an Indian to lead him to Peak Hill, Cue and all the small mining settlements until they reached Leonora and finally Menzies. This was quite an arduous journey for a man in his late sixties. The trip was 1770 kilometres long, taking three months, but left him with no ill health effects other than a very burnt face.

On 11 November 1907 in the Shire Council Chambers, Frank was elected President of the ASSOCIATION OF EARLY PIONEERS OF MENZIES, which had restricted membership to those who had arrived in Menzies prior to the end of 1895. There was a lot of discontent over this rule from those who had arrived in the town in early 1896, which in the end affected no one because there were no recorded annual reunions.

Frank WALTON joined his niece Catherine HARROLD in April 1911 to holiday in Britain. On their return Catherine resided in Subiaco and Frank returned to Menzies only to leave permanently in January 1912 because of ill health. Frank WALTON died on 24 February 1915 at the Valesco Private Hospital, Perth.

Frank WALTON's PIONEER STORE remained in operation under nephew Joseph until 1916/17.

Another of Frank WALTON's nephews Alban Walton FENNELL died 3 August 1916, aged 27 and is buried in the Menzies Cemetery. His headstone was paid for by his cousin Joseph HARROLD.

Talkin' Tjuntjuntjara...

Tjuntjuntjara's very own rock band **The Desert Stars** have had a couple of very big months. In response to a submission lodged in early March through Tjuntjuntjara CRC, the **Desert Stars** received an invitation from Western Australia Music (WAM) to travel to Kalgoorlie to record an original song for the compilation album 'Sounds of the Goldfields'. Nine other acts from the Eastern and Northern Goldfields also contributed songs to the album. The band recorded another three original songs which are to be produced as an EP with assistance from WAM.

The Sounds of the Goldfields CD was launched on 28 May at the Goldfields Art Centre by album artists to a full house. **The Desert Stars** were subsequently invited to perform at the Indigenous Language Conference in Coolgardie on 16 June and then for the Road Boss Rally participants at Ilkurlka on 18 June. From Ilkurlka the band travelled to the Ngaanyatjarra Media Centre Recording Studios in Wingellina to record their second CD of 11 original songs. The Community engaged an experienced producer/sound engineer, Leigh Ivin, from Tamworth to record the CD. Leigh will mix the CD and have it mastered in his studio in Tamworth. He will also be involved in the promotion of the album after completion.

The Desert Stars were also invited to perform at the Eastern Goldfields Regional Prison during NAIDOC Week, but had to decline due to the need to rest after such a hectic schedule.

The Desert Stars next live performance will be at Oak Valley, SA playing with Troy Cassar-Daley 9 August 2016

The Desert Stars are hoping to launch their CD in Melbourne in a bid to get their music exposed to the whole nation. After the launch they are hoping to follow up with concerts in Menzies and Kalgoorlie.

Students visit Tjuntjuntjara for Spinifex Story Writing Camp



MCS students Shakira Tucker and Lori Harris travelled to Tjuntjuntjara, accompanied by Yvette Tressider and Ethon Tucker to participate in a Spinifex Story Writing Camp. The students were joined by others from Firbank Grammar, Laverton Remote School and Mt Margaret Remote Community School for the camp. Authors and illustrators Ann James, Judy Watson and Gregg Dreise gave their time to run workshops with the kids, as well as staff from the Indigenous Literacy Foundation and most importantly staff from the Schools and Tjuntjuntjara Principle

Charlie Klein.

Whilst attending the camp the kids were able to focus on developing story writing skills and illustrations, as well as other activities including Punu Puppet making, digging for fossils, and painting and throwing boomerangs. The last night at camp brought the community together for a cookup.

The collection of stories will be made into a book to be released next year. The book launch for last years stories will be held in Sydney in the month of September, published by the Indigenous Literacy Foundation.

The workshops were supported also by Tjuntjuntjara Remote Community School, AngloGold Ashanti, Tjuntjuntjara Rangers and Spinifex Health Tjuntjuntjara.

GOLDFIELDS CYCLASSIC 2016

The Goldfields CyClassic began long before the weekend of 4 & 5 June 2016, preparations had been taking place for nearly 12 months leading up to the event.

The first ever cycle race from Menzies began on 4 June 1928 on the King's Birthday with twenty four riders making the 81 mile distance from Menzies to Kalgoorlie.

This years race follows on from the change to make the race travel the 131kms to Menzies and on a second day travel 105km to Leonora. 154 riders were registered in 2016 including the community challenge. Wet weather over the weekend made for tough conditions for riders, with the Saturday seeing 15 riders crashing just kilometres from the finish line in Menzies. Thankfully Menzies volunteer Ambulance officers were on hand to assist those requiring urgent medical attention and others were treated for minor injuries in the



CRC in Menzies.

A successful day was had by volunteers raising money for the Menzies St John Ambulance Sub Centre. From the sausage sizzle and collection tins, \$1500 was raised for the branch. Tea and coffee sold at the CRC raised \$32.10 for Menzies Community School.

DJ Rev and Faye Makin joined us again this year providing music and entertainment through out the event, even showing us all how it's done on the dancefloor!

On the Saturday evening 209 people attended the CyClassic dinner provided by the Kookynie Volunteers Association. This year banners painted in previous years by MCS Students adorned the Town Hall walls as well as a special banner painted by this year's students. This year's banner displayed a road map showing the journey from Kalgoorlie to Menzies and on to Leonora, showcasing local attractions. The banner was so popular this year that the Goldfields CyClassic Committee decided to feature it in their 2017 program. During the dinner presentations took place for the winners of various sprints and was followed by fireworks.

The Leonora Golden Wheels saw more wet weather with Samuel Lane slipping on a final corner and Timothy Sellar clinching the victory as well as the title of overall winner. Rebecca Mackey made it as the first female over the line for 2016. Many thanks to those involved in the planning and ground work to make the race happen. The biggest thanks to the Shire of Menzies, as they are the largest contributor to the event and also to the volunteers who donate their time and efforts to the event.

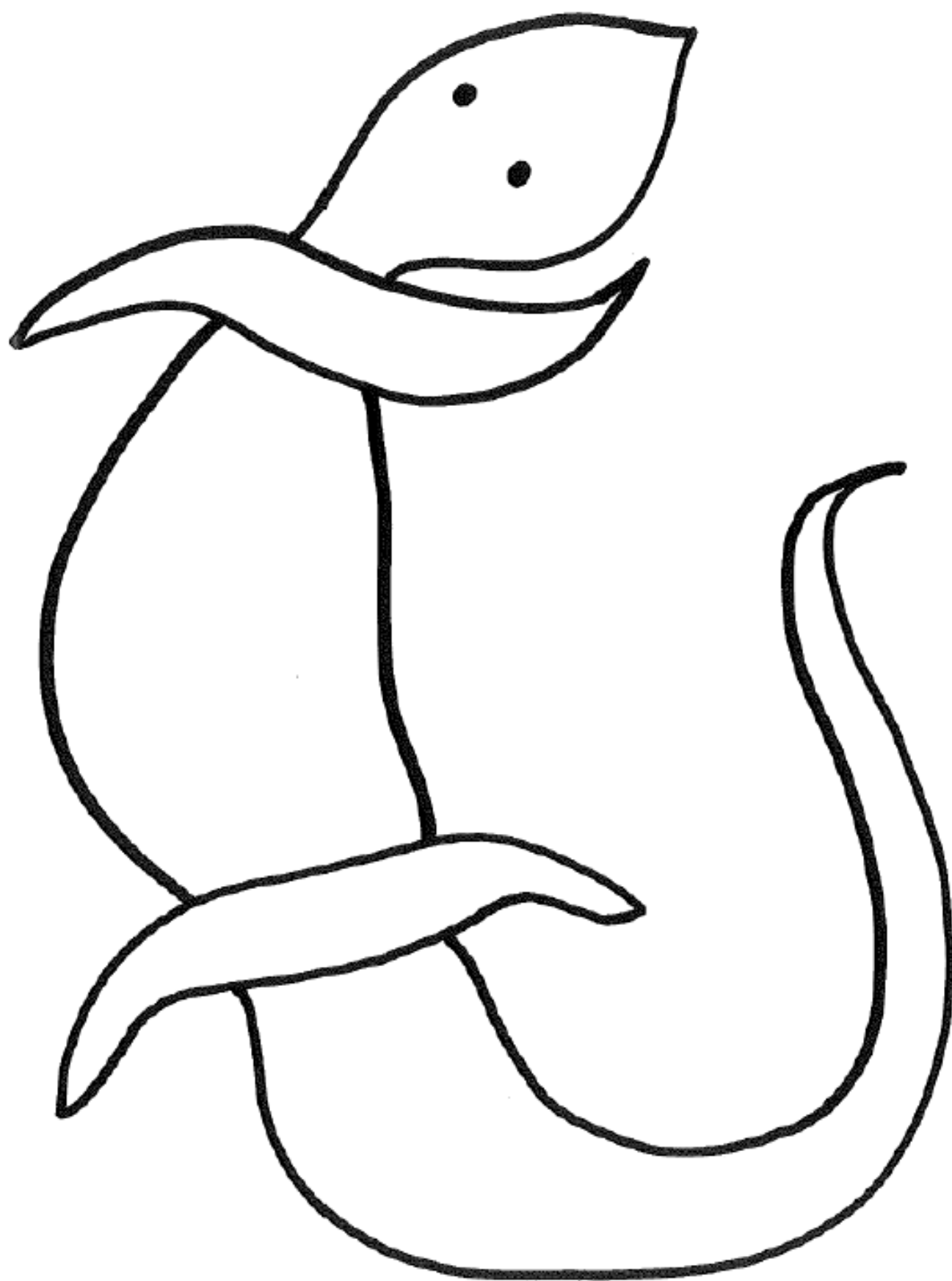

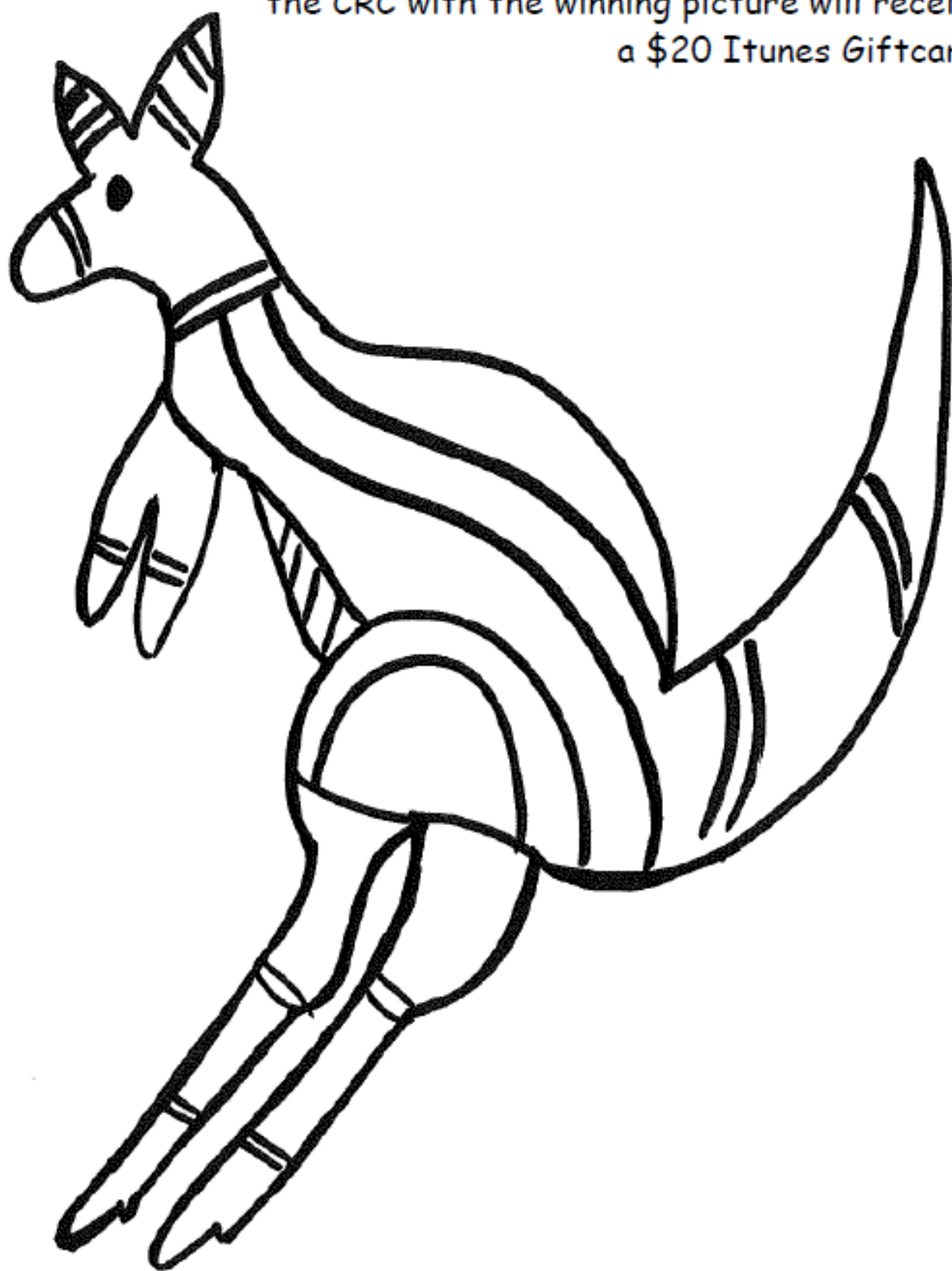

St John Ambulance Menzies SubCentre Volunteers Training Day

Volunteer Ambulance Officers at the St John Ambulance Menzies SubCentre were participating in training for Spinal and Trauma Awareness. They were using a Kendrick Extrication Device (KED) which is used to remove victims of vehicle accidents from motor vehicles. The KED is a semi-rigid brace which gives support to the head, neck and torso and is able to reduce the possibility of additional injuries when removing a patient from a vehicle. The KED is often used in conjunction with a cervical collar allowing the torso to maintain an anatomically neutral position.

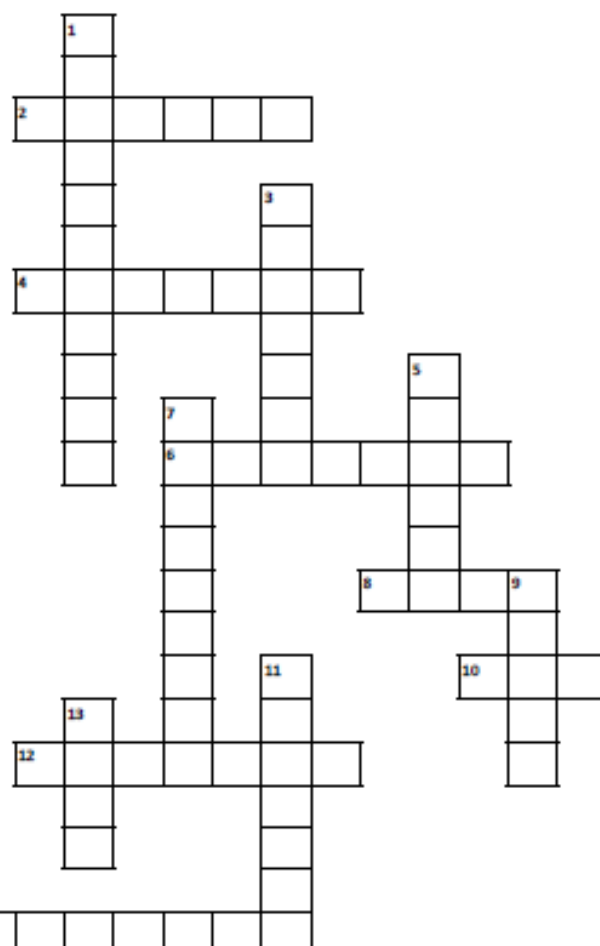
