THE SHIRE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

June 2021

A Special Meeting of Council was held on the 6 of May at which Council awarded the tender of road improvements and repairs of the Tjuntjuntjara access road to Fraser Range Station, and in doing so, Council is pleased to partner with a contractor that is familiar with the area and conditions, and the Shire is also able to assist in furthering their experience.



At the initial 2021-2022 budget workshop on 18 May, with the Shire of Menzies financial consultant, Rhona Hawkins in attendance, papers were presented to Councillors for consideration and discussion. Updated paperwork will now be forthcoming for a further budget workshop in early June.

Discussion at the briefing session of 20 May included increased mining activity and Phase 3 of the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program, with \$1.1mil to be spent by 30/06/2023 and available from 01/01/2022.

Preparations for the Menzies Classic/ Goldfields Cyclclassic are well underway for the 5th and 6 th of June and will be the 92nd year of the Chas Egan Memorial Handicaps Race.

Along with the recent rains, an increase in all the numbers feeding along the Goldfields Highway and other roads exiting the Menzies Town site, I urge motorists to be cautious following the observation of several cattle carcasses recently in the Menzies Shire.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

June 2021

This edition of Menzies Matters is out a bit earlier than normal. The long weekend is approaching and it's all hands-on deck as we prepare for the CyClassic. The event is the biggest on our calendar and it takes a lot of work to ensure that everything is in good shape for the visitors coming to town. The number of entrants for this year's event is really great considering the issues we have all faced over the last two years.

Internally we have been putting next year's budget together and finalising the audit from last financial year. The audit was delayed and has been a difficult process with our auditors not being able to get to site and therefore having to do the audit remotely. With the audit expected to be completed this week we have scheduled the Annual Elector's Meeting for 29 June 2021 in the Town Hall. Further details are in the advertisement within this edition.

While talking about budgets it would be remiss of me not to mention that Council has decided not to increase rates or fees and charges for the next financial year. Although this will put us a bit behind our long-term financial plan, Council thought it was the responsible thing to do as the local economy gets back on its feet.

A couple of quick updates to finish in regard to projects. The truck stop amenities are almost finished with a shade structure and seating to go up over the next few weeks. We get great feedback from the drivers and it encourages them to stop in town. Resheeting has been occurring on Evanston and Menzies NW Roads. Our intention is to seal another 10km of Menzies NW Road before the end of the calendar year and a small portion of Evanston Road. Tenders will also go out in the next couple of weeks for works on a few of our historic buildings.

As always, I appreciate any feedback on how your Council is performing. Good or bad helps us to improve and know what is important to the residents.

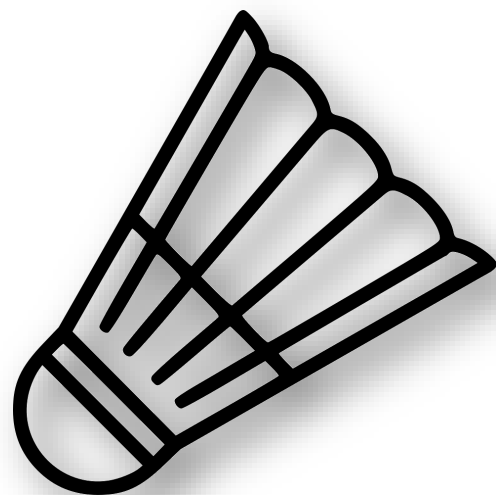

**SHIRE OF MENZIES LOCAL PLANNING SCHEME & LOCAL PLANNING STRATEGY
AVAILABLE FOR INSPECTION & COMMENT**

The Shire of Menzies writes to advise that it has prepared a local planning scheme and local planning strategy and is inviting your comment upon these documents.

The *Planning and Development Act 2005* requires local governments to periodically review their local planning schemes, and the Shire of Menzies has prepared Local Planning Scheme No.2 for comment.

The purposes of this scheme are to -

- A) set out the local government's planning aims and intentions for the Scheme area;
- B) set aside land as local reserves for public purposes;
- C) zone land within the Scheme area for the purposes defined in this Scheme;
- D) control and guide development including processes for the preparation of structure plans, precinct plans, layout plans and local development plans;
- E) set out procedures for the assessment and determination of development applications;
- F) set out procedures for contributions to be made for the costs of providing infrastructure in connection with development through development contribution plans;
- G) make provision for the administration and enforcement of this Scheme;
- H) address other matters referred to in Schedule 7 of the Act.

A local planning strategy is a strategic document that:

- a) sets out the long-term planning directions for the local government;
- b) applies any state or regional planning policy that is relevant to the strategy;
- c) provides the rationale for any zoning or classification of land under the local planning scheme.

A hard copy of both documents can be viewed at the Shire Office, Shenton Street, Menzies and at the Western Australian Planning Commission, 140 William Street, Perth, and will be available for inspection during office hours up to and including 2 July 2021.

The documents, and a submission form should you wish to make comment, can also be viewed online at www.menzies.wa.gov.au

Submissions on the local planning scheme and local planning strategy may be lodged in writing and should include the property affected and details of the submission and must be lodged with the undersigned on or before 2 July 2021.

Goldfields Cyclclassic

History

Messrs J. Richards, JC Walsh, Chas Egan along with a small committee set about organising a long distance event. Their choice of starting point was the small mining town of Menzies, 81 miles north of Kalgoorlie. Many business men of the Goldfields supported the venture and, on the King's birthday, June 1928 at 8.00am, the limit men were sent away for the first "Menzies". Twenty four riders started in this event.

From its inauguration in 1928 until 1932, the race was known as the Menzies-Kalgoorlie Road Race, but two days before the race of that year, Charlie Egan, the well liked and highly respected secretary of the club, tragically died, and all riders in the race that year wore black armbands as a token of respect. It was decided later that the race should, in future, be known as the "Chas Egan Memorial Race".

Mention of the Menzies Classic is not complete without some comment on the road. During the first five years, the term "road" could hardly apply to the bush track, rough, ripply and sandy, that connected Menzies to Kalgoorlie, and the stretch from Menzies to Comet Vale was a cyclist's nightmare, being almost axle deep sand.

By the late thirties, the road improved. Although it was still far from perfect, at least by then a cyclist could heave a sigh of relief when he reached bitumen at Broad Arrow, instead of bumping over ripples, skidding into ruts and ploughing through sand for the rest of the journey right into Hannan Street, as the early cyclists did.

The inaugural winner R. Bennets won the race in a time of 5 hours and 55 minutes, 45 seconds to cover the 81 miles from Menzies to Kalgoorlie. The great road rider R. Hudson set a high bench mark with the fastest time in the inaugural handicapped race of 4 hours and 48 minutes, 45 seconds, and would go on to win the next two Menzies to Kalgoorlie Road Races.

In 2011 Hon. John Bowler, MLA, Member for Kalgoorlie at that time, came up with the idea of combining the Menzies Classic with the Leonora Golden Gift which was also held during the same weekend. EGCC Executive Committee members, Dr Ruth Murdie and Rob and Maree Northcoat turned the idea into reality and the first "Goldfields Cyclclassic" was held. Their efforts have made this event a "must-do" handicap event with a reputation of being one of the most professional and well organized races in WA. This is the tenth "Goldfields Cyclclassic" with the event growing from strength to strength each year.

MENZIES CLASSIC – 2008

The Menzies to Kalgoorlie race has a wonderful history which will be reflected in the excitement of this year's event. The race commenced in 1928, following a discussion at a club meeting concerning the lack of distance races on the Goldfields, Messrs J Richards, JC Walsh, Chas Egan along with a small committee set about organising a long distance event. Their choice of starting point was the small mining town of Menzies, 81 miles north of Kalgoorlie. Many of the business men of the Goldfields supported the venture and, on the King's Birthday, June 1928, at 8:00am, the limit men were sent away for the first "Menzies". Twenty-four riders started in this event.

From its inauguration in 1928 until 1932 the race was known as the Menzies-Kalgoorlie Road Race, but two days before the race of that year Charlie Egan, the well-liked and highly respected secretary of the club, tragically died, and all riders in the race that year wore black armbands as a token of respect. The Kookynie men played brilliantly and were victorious, which should have put them on very good terms with themselves but it was not to be. Something that appeared a week ago in the "Press", reflecting on the integrity of footballers generally but bearing special reference to a few champions mostly working at the Cosmopolitan rankled still in the bosom of a section of ardent leather-hunting spirits, and they wanted revenge, gore, anything.

Calling 000

Police, Fire or Ambulance

When you are transferred to the correct service you may be asked the following questions:
What is the address of the emergency? Street, cross reference or landmark will be required.

What is the telephone number you are calling from? This is in case your call is terminated or further information is required.

Tell me exactly what has happened? Provide a brief description of the problem.

How old is s/he? If unknown then approximate age.

Is s/he awake (conscious)? Yes or no answer required.

Is s/he breathing? Yes or no answer required.

The Communications Officer will then ask a series of further questions more specific to the problem identified. Answering these questions will ensure the most appropriate ambulance response is provided.

The Communications Officer will give you advice over the phone to assist the patient prior to the arrival of an ambulance. They may also ask you to turn on front lights if it is dark; if possible have someone wait out the front; and make sure the door is unlocked and open so the paramedics can enter.

Please remember to try and stay calm and speak slowly to the Communications Officer. Often an ambulance will be dispatched while you are still on the phone.

If in doubt you should always call triple zero (000). Sadly many people do not call for an ambulance as they are unsure of whether the situation is an emergency or they are concerned about the cost.

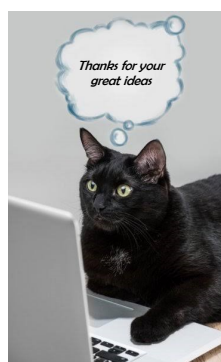

SEVEN GOLDEN RULES FOR PROSPECTING

1.

Put safety first

- Make sure you have enough water, fuel, maps and first aid supplies.
- Give serious consideration to taking some form of telecommunications and a global positioning system to fix locations, and a Personal Locator Beacon (PLB) – it may turn out to be your most important safety device.

2.

Obtain a Miner's Right permit

when prospecting on vacant Crown land
(\$25 from any Mining Registrar's office).

3.

Obtain a 40E permit

prior to prospecting within an exploration tenement
(if you don't have written permission from the tenement holder).

4.

Get written permission

from the tenement holder when prospecting on:

- a mining lease
- an exploration licence (if you don't have a 40E permit)
- a prospecting licence

5.

Comply with all legal requirements
